County Judge Will Relieve Justice Hunsaker

County Judge A. C. Bunnell, acting for Justice Hunsaker, who left today for Richardson Hot Springs, near Chico, was insured a busy afternoon by sheriff's deputies who yesterday arrested five men on various charges.

Wright Hicks, Richard Lamb, H. E. Gray and Jim Medley were arrested on the Keno road late yesterday by Deputy Fred Snyder. The men are charged with being drunk and disorderly on a public highway.

Deputy James Hilton, out with his family for a Sunday ride, yesterday noticed a man leave a car and stroll off into the sagebrush on the Keno road, about four miles from town.

Following a hunch, Hilton reported the matter at the sheriff's office and Deputy Snyder drove out near the spot indicated and planted himself in the sagebrush to wait.

At about 5 o'clock one James Farrell appeared on the scene, left his car and proceeded into the sagebrush. When he emerged a few moments later he was heavily laden with five bottles of what Snyder declares is good moonshine.

He is charged with possession of liquor and his case was set for preliminary hearing late this afternoon before Judge Bunnell.

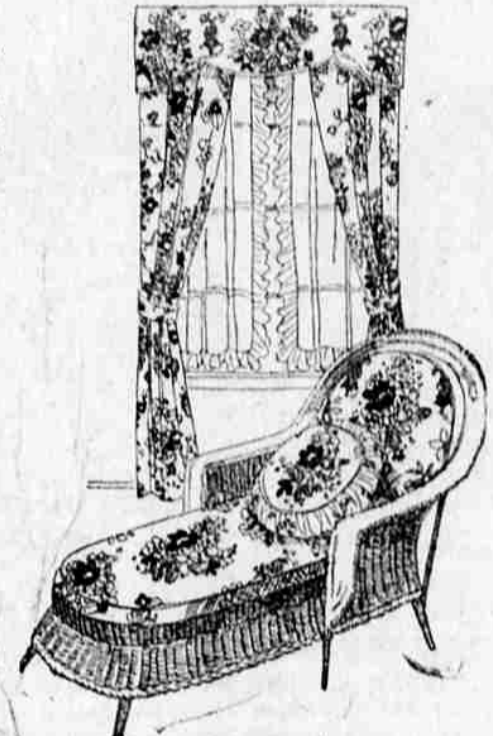
