

## APARTMENT HOUSE TO RISE

### Chris Blanas to Build at Eleventh and Walnut

With the breaking of ground today on Walnut and 11th, comes the announcement of a three-story strictly modern apartment building of 56 apartments, to be known as the Arcade Apartments, being built by Chris Blanas, owner of the Arcade Hotel of this city.

The apartment which will be completed as soon as possible, will be 100x100 feet and will be made of either brick or concrete, the material not being decided on as yet. The fifty-six apartments will be furnished throughout and will include 44 two-room apartments, including living room with disappearing bed, kitchenette and bath. The remaining dozen apartments will be of three rooms, living room with disappearing bed, one bed room, kitchenette and bath. Each apartment will be provided with an electric range.

### Completely Modern

According to Mr. Blanas no money will be spared to make the apartment modern and comfortable in every respect for people desiring a moderate priced place to live.

In the basement ample room will be arranged to care for all baggage of the tenants.

The location, which is considered quite desirable, will shortly have all streets paved, construction work being under way for the paving at the present time by the Warren Construction company.

### To Be in Charge

Charles Cosboom drew the plans for the building and Mr. Blanas plans to supervise the work himself, as well as manage it when the structure is completed. He plans to continue in the hotel business as in the past, but will put Mrs. Georgina Wilson in charge of the hotel. Mrs. Wilson has been at the Arcade hotel for the past three months and is considered an experienced hotel woman.

In building the apartment Mr. Blanas is erecting it so that he will be able to add to it, making it larger if the demand proves worth while.

## LANGELL VALLEY CELEBRATION TO BE GREAT EVENT

### Barbecue, Public Speaking and Athletic Events to be Staged Sunday

Next Sunday will be a memorable day in the lives of the farmers of the Langell Valley section, for on that day the gates will be opened and water will start flowing upon an additional 16,000 acres of that fertile land.

Celebrating this occasion, the Langell Valley Community club has prepared for a big barbecue and other events, and arrangements are being made to take care of a crowd of more than 3000 people.

Also there will be a big barbecue at noon, for which two big steers, a pair of fat porkers and a flock of sheep will be prepared for the hungry crowd. The farmers will furnish bread, butter, pickles and other condiments for the barbecued meat. There will be plenty of food for everybody.

The Langell folks have issued a general invitation to all persons in the county to attend the big celebration and rejoice with them over this reclamation of the 16,000 additional acres of Langell Valley land.

## LOOTING STARTS AT MINE STRIKE IN NOVA SCOTIA

### 12,000 Workers Alleged to be Taking Part in Incendiarism as Well

### CLASH WITH TROOPS

### Soldiers on Guard at Night—Barbed Wire Entanglements Are Placed

SYDNEY, N. S. June 16. (AP)—Incendiarism and looting attending the strike of 12,000 miners broke out with renewed vigor early today despite the presence of more than 500 dominion troops and special miners' police.

The bank head screen of the unused colliery of the British Empire Steel corporation at New Aberdeen, was destroyed by fire.

Barbed wire entanglements had been thrown about the property, searchlights were playing and troops were on guard throughout the night.

### Homes Burned

How persons that set the fire crept through the lines could not be distinguished. The homes of two former employees of the company were burned down, the flames spreading rapidly to an empty powder magazine and carpenter shop before being brought under control.

Retail stores owned by private individuals at Bras D'Or and Florence were looted by mobs of several hundred men. The mines give the appearance of armed camps. More troops were reported on the way from Ottawa and Toronto, including detachments of the famous royal dragons.

### Wage Dispute

The walkout in the Cape Breton area was called by United Mine Workers officials last March as the result of a wage dispute with the company during which the miners credit at the stores had been cut off.

James Murdock, Canadian minister of labor, arrived here today to offer his services as mediator in what he has called the "Too long drawn out" struggle between the steel corporation and the miners. He will study the situation for both sides.

## School Election Proves Surprise

### Many Voters Write in Name of John Reber on Ballots

What was scheduled to be a quiet and routine school election yesterday was disrupted by the action of a large body of citizens in the Malin and Merrill districts, who rushed to the polls and with a big surprise vote placed John Reber of Malin on the ballot for school director. Reber's name was written in on the ballots.

In the Malin district, Reber polled 106 votes as against the solitary one polled by his opponent, George Offield. In the Henley district the count stood 11 to 2 in favor of Reber.

County School Superintendent Peterson said this afternoon that the result of the election would be in doubt until all the ballots were in. To date there have been only five returns out of 60 precincts.

There were four candidates to be elected and as only four men were nominated it was assumed by some that the election would be a mere formality.

Those nominated were R. Looney of Fort Klamath, Roy Nelson of Reno, George Offield of Merrill and Charles Mack of Henley. With the exception of Offield, all others seem to be assured of election.

Final returns and a complete count will not be available for at least a day, in the opinion of Superintendent Peterson.

LOS ANGELES, June 16. (AP)—Another arrest, that of a young and handsome woman was declared imminent today by Edward King, investigator of the district attorney's office, in connection with the killing of Grace Grogan Young, former widow of Patrick Grogan, olive millionaire.

The dead woman's husband, Dr. Thomas W. Young, already has confessed his part in the killing and King said, is believed to be shielding his accomplice.

## Hoists Flag Over Mexican Property

### Former Consular Agent Stirs up Natives When He Shows Patriotism

MEXICO CITY, June 16. (AP)—Dispatches from Puebla say W. O. Jenkins, former United States consular agent at Puebla, whose kidnapping by Mexican bandits in 1919, created a serious international situation, has hoisted the American flag over all his ranch properties in Puebla state. The dispatch addit disorders are feared and much ill feeling has been caused because the Mexicans consider this action a taunt.

## Shive Re-Elected To School Board Without Opponent

## Eight Nabbed In Morning Roundup

Much to his surprise, Mayor Fred R. Goddard was today informed that he was listed as having taken part in a raid last night which resulted in the arrest of seven men and a woman and the capture of a large quantity of liquor. Goddard did not know of the raid until this morning.

The raid was made on a house at 2405 Radcliffe avenue and was participated in by the entire night police force and deputies from the sheriff's office, under the leadership of Chief of Police Loucks.

A quantity of alleged beer was taken and much equipment was smashed, including more than 100 bottles.

Five of the group were fined this morning on drunkenness charges. The others were held on open charges and are being investigated.

## REVELATION OF LIQUOR RING IS FOUND IN BOOKS

### Gangland War in Chicago Results in Uncovering Important Evidence

### RECORDS ARE FOUND

### State's Attorney Says he can Send Entire Gang of Crooks to Prison

CHICAGO, June 16. (AP)—Six leather bound books which, according to the police form a complete revelation of the operations of one of Chicago's largest liquor rings have come in possession of authorities through the drive on the city's gangsters.

In a raid in the headquarters of the Genesee brothers one of whom, Mike Genesee was slain in Saturday's street fight between gang members and police, the police found records of liquor receipts and shipments; names of shippers; the prices received and the prices paid for the rings product. There were even receipts for gas bills paid, one revealing that some "Cookers" of gas used as much as \$199 worth of gas a month.

The papers also revealed, authorities said, the identity of a fourth person connected with the gangs who participated in Saturday's fight. State's Attorney Crowe characterized the documents as enough ammunition to send to the pen or drive out of the city every one of the Genesee gang "from the four Genesees" who are left, down to their lowliest imported distiller or shotgun man.

Howard Eby, head of the immigration bureau in Chicago disclosed that Mike Genesee had been questioned last week in connection with the activities of Vincenzo Azzarello, a Genesee agent arrested in Tampa, Fla. Azzarello was said to have seven immigrants with him, believed to have been smuggled into the country by way of the Bermudas. Eby said the Genesees were importing men from southern Italy and Sicily, delivered in Chicago for \$500 a head.

## Runaway Youth Makes Second Prison Escape

### Angus Johnson, Aged 14, Outwits Roseburg Jailer

ROSEBURG, Ore., June 15.—Angus Johnson, runaway boy from Portland, who was recaptured yesterday after escaping from the county jail, was successful in a second break last night. The boy, on his first attempt, pulled a board through the jail window and used it as a lever to spread the bars sufficiently to permit him to slip through. He was recaptured and upon being returned to jail was placed in solitary confinement.

Last night the night officer released him for a few minutes to exercise in the main corridor and while the officer was not looking the boy again slipped through the bars, which had not been straightened and found a safe hiding place.

The 14-year-old boy is the son of Mrs. H. D. Johnson of Portland, who had asked the officers to hold the boy until she could come for him.

## Gasoline Cars Explode When Train Crashes

### Damage Estimated at \$100,000 Caused by Wreck

CASPER, Wyo., June 16.—Twenty tank cars containing gasoline were derailed in a wreck near Glendo, Wyo., today. Investigation by officials disclosed total damage estimated conservatively at \$100,000.

After numerous explosions all of the 20 cars are burning and due to the high wind it is thought impossible to save any of them. J. C. Grisinger, superintendent of this division, left at 1 o'clock to personally investigate the wreck.

All cars wrecked are owned by the Union Tank Line company and were carrying Standard and Midwest gasoline.

## Three Dead And One Injured In Auto Smash-up

PORTLAND, June 16. (AP)—Two men and one woman were killed, and another woman was seriously injured in a collision between an automobile and a street car here early this morning. The dead: Ray Stockdale, 26, seventh infantry, Vancouver Barracks, Wash., driver of car, instantly killed.

Arthur Moore, 22, seventh infantry band, Vancouver Barracks, died at 7:25 a. m.

Mrs. Evelyn Stevens, 26, waitress, Vancouver, instantly killed.

The injured woman, Mrs. Christine Bowdin, 23, Vancouver, was in a hospital this morning suffering from cuts, broken bones and possible fracture of the skull.

The automobile, a heavy sedan crashed head-on into a street car on Union avenue, thoroughfare leading to Vancouver. According to accounts received by the police it was traveling at a high rate of speed and swerved to the wrong side of the street, without apparent reason, hitting the street car.

## FIFTEEN KILLED BY TRAIN WRECK IN NEW JERSEY

### Scores Injured When Special Leaves Rails During Big Thunder Storm

### WERE MOSTLY ALIENS

### Persons to be Deported Die When Lightning Spreads Rails Early Today

HACKETTSTOWN, N. J., June 16. (AP)—At least fifteen are believed to have been killed and scores injured in the wreck of a special seven car Delaware, Lackawanna and Western railroad train a mile west of here today.

Twisted by lightning and undermined by heavy rains, the tracks gave way beneath the train and the cars and engine piled up on one another.

Reports said the train carried 182 passengers, mostly aliens from Chicago en route to Hoboken, where they were said to sail for Europe today. Most of them were asleep when coaches pounded upon one another in the steam and scalding water bursting from the wrecked locomotive.

The engineer, fireman and conductor were killed. Fifteen bodies have been taken from the wreck.

First reports made to the board of public utility commissioners by Lackawanna railway officials said three had been killed and 76 injured.

In this report it was said that lightning struck one of the rails, throwing it out of place, that a landslide due to the severe storm had covered the rails and that the track also had been undermined.

## SON IS ENROUTE TO VISIT MOTHER

Mrs. Wilbur Jones this afternoon received a cablegram from mid-ocean from her son, Carl Newbury, saying he would arrive in two weeks.

For the past two and one-half years Mr. Newbury has been abroad, being employed by the Admiral-Dollar Lines Steamship company, acting as manager of the passenger department of this Oriental line. For 18 months he was stationed at Shanghai and last October was transferred to Manila, where he has been ever since.

Mr. Newbury will be well remembered here, where he graduated from the local high school, later attending the University of Oregon, majoring in business administration and foreign trade. Shortly after graduating he left for abroad and this will be his first visit home. Mrs. Jones expects he will come directly home to visit her.

## McKenzie Pass To Be Open Tomorrow

BEND, Ore., June 16.—The McKenzie pass highway over the mile-high Cascades which has been closed to traffic since last October, will be open Wednesday morning, according to word received in Bend from those in charge of work on the highway.

The tractor is being used on the bad spots in the road over the lava fields today and automobile traffic will be able to cross Wednesday morning. Several cars have already made the crossing, according to information from Sisters, but it was not considered even then really open for traffic.

## Way Now Faces Murder Charge

Frank Way, alleged slayer of Timothy Murphy during a fist fight over a black sheep, was indicted on a first degree murder charge by the grand jury late yesterday.

The coming trial is expected to be bitterly fought. Horace Manning has been employed as special prosecutor and will have as his opponent C. E. Stone.

Exact date of the trial has not been determined. No criminal cases will be heard until July 6, according to the announcement of Judge A. L. Leavitt yesterday.

## 3 TO FACE SERIOUS CHARGE

### Deputy Sheriff Kendall Shot by Drink-Crazed Men

Charges of assault with a dangerous weapon, with intent to kill, will be filed against Ed Fuller, his son Charles Fuller, and Jim Burke, held here following a shooting orgy on the Klamath Falls-Olene road last night in which Deputy Sheriff Ed Kendall suffered a bullet-shattered left arm and right leg. Jim Burke was shot in the foot and Jack Hawkins of Olene was struck below the knee by a stray bullet, a superficial wound resulting.

This was the information given out this morning by Acting District Attorney D. R. Vandenberg, following a consultation with Sheriff Burt Hawkins.

Deputy Kendall and Burke are at the Klamath Valley hospital. Kendall was shot through the arm above the elbow with a .30 caliber Luger bullet with a hollow point. The bullet mushroomed and shattered the bone and then spread, following the bone. The bullet in the leg passed completely through the white part of the bone above the knee joint. Despite the fact that he is suffering intense pain, doctors are of the opinion that he will recover unless complications set in.

Burke's injuries are declared not to be serious.

The triple shooting climaxed a weird evening of thrills which began shortly after 7:00 o'clock.

### Shot at Woman

At this hour an unidentified woman called the sheriff's office, stating that she had been fired on by three men in a light truck while driving on the highway near Olene.

Sheriff Hawkins and Deputy Kendall left for the scene. When they had been gone about 10 minutes another call came into the sheriff's office, advising that F. O. Poole had been held up by three men on the highway.

Approaching the scene, Hawkins and Kendall observed the light truck drawn up beside the highway and stopped about 50 feet from it.

Kendall, on approaching the truck climbed into the back seat of Hawkins car and as the car stopped leaped to the ground, preceding Hawkins.

### Fire at Deputy

As he ran he drew his gun and called on the Fullers and Burke to throw up their hands. The three were lined up beside their truck and as Kendall spoke Burke opened fire with his Luger automatic, ceasing only when the magazine was empty, a matter of perhaps five seconds.

Kendall returned the fire and Burke toppled over backwards.

Young Fuller jumped to the rear of the truck, drawing his gun. Hawkins followed him, covered him with his revolver and ordered him to surrender. Fuller complied with the request.

In the meantime Jack Hawkins, Olene resident, had driven up. He observed the shooting and was struck by a glancing bullet below the knee but not seriously hurt.

### Procures Gun

Seeing that Burke was struggling to rise, Jack Hawkins secured the Luger and gave it to Sheriff Hawkins.

Kendall was immediately brought to town in a passing car and Sheriff Hawkins remained guarding the Fullers and the wounded Burke.

All three were raging and several times threatened to rush Sheriff Hawkins, who remained calm and warned them to stand back. When more officers arrived the three were subdued and brought to Klamath Falls. The Fullers are now in the

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
