Cascade Tunnel Nearly Finished

BEND June 16.—Daylight is expected to be seen through the tunnel under the Cascades on the Naton cut off some time Friday according to telephone reports from Stewart and Welch, contractors in charge this morning. Celebrations by and for the workmen will be held at each end of the tunnel Sunday.

The tunnel, when daylight is cut through will be little more than high enough for workmen to get through below the timbers, according to W. J. Perry, lumber forester for the Deschutes National Forest, who returned this morning from several days at Odell Lake. He has been in charge of the timber being cut from the national forests for the tunnel timbers and tunnel "packing."

Six pumps are being run on the west side of the tunnel construction pumping out the water. Since the tunnel grade is to the west, no pumps are needed on the west side and as soon as the tunnel is cut through the water from this side can be disposed of with less expense by gravity through the west entrance, according to information given out in Bend.

All the tunnel timbers and cord wood used for tunnel "packing" has been cut according to Perry. This included two and a half million feet of Douglas fir in the Deschutes National Forest used for timbering the tunnel and 1600 cords of Hemlock half from the Deschutes and half from the Cascade national forests. The timber sales were all handled through the Deschutes forestry office in Bend.

Will Terminate Rifflian Warfare

PARIS, June 16. (AP)—The French cabinet today approved Premier Painleve's plans for a quick termination of the Rifflian warfare in Morocco and it was announced that French warships had been stationed off the Rifflian coast today.

M. Painleve arrived from Morocco where he visited the French front five minutes before the cabinet session began.

The premier reported to the cabinet the measures he had taken while in Morocco "to reduce to a minimum the risks and duration of the military operations there."

It was stated that a joint Franco-Spanish arrangement had been made for patrolling the rifflian coast.

Autoist Held For Carrying Revolver

MEDFORD, Ore., June 16.—E. R. Jones of the Log Cabin garage in the Siskiyou mountains was bound over to the grand jury Monday under the new state law prohibiting the transporting of concealed weapons in automobiles. Jones, with a companion, was arrested for a violation of the traffic laws and a high-powered pistol was found on the seat between them. According to the district attorney's office, Jones admitted ownership of the gun.

The arrest was the first in this county under the new law, which compels the justice of peace to bind the defendant to the grand jury. The circuit court cannot parole or suspend sentence, under the law, and the governor cannot grant a pardon. It is reported to be the only law on the Oregon statute books denying the governor this privilege.
