

PORTLAND WATER SHIPMENTS HIGH FOR LAST MONTH

Many Cargoes Total 32 Per Cent Higher Than Last Year

PORTLAND, Oregon.—Lumber shipments from the Columbia River during the month of May amounted to 91,788,169 feet. This is an increase of 29,427,329 feet over the same month for the year 1924 or an increase of nearly 32%. Of this amount 62,000,000 feet was cleared from Portland and 29,000,000 feet from Astoria. As was the usual case, the larger amounts of foreign and intercoastal shipments cleared from Portland while the larger amount of domestic shipments cleared from down river points. One surprising item in Portland's shipments was the fact that coastwise shipments were larger than either the foreign or the intercoastal. This is not usually true of Portland's shipments. Lumber shipments from Portland the first five months of 1925 have been much greater to domestic ports but not as large to foreign markets. A year ago we were in the midst of the large shipments to Japan due to the earthquake there and the records made at that time in foreign shipments are liable to last for some time. Dur-

ing the month of January alone in 1924 shipments of 55,000,000 feet were made from Portland of which more than 40,000,000 feet were delivered in Japan. The intercoastal and coastwise shipments from Portland however have shown a very gratifying increase during this year and every month so far has shown an increase over the same month of the previous year. More than 37,000,000 feet more have been shipped this year to these ports and during the same period last year.

The figures for the Columbia River show that more than 3,000,000 feet per day were shipped from the Columbia River and eliminating Sundays and holidays the amount placed aboard steamers each day approximates 4,000,000 feet. An interesting shipment clearing during June was the Atlantic which cleared on the first with 3,391,206 feet of lumber destined for various west coast ports in South America such as Peru and Chile. This is a large shipment for any steamer to take and a particularly large one for this district. It consists of fir and pine lumber and fir timbers. Other items carried by this vessel were flour, cereals and dried fruit.

The West Keats of the Oregon Oriental Line cleared on the second with a cargo consisting of 3,779,757 feet of lumber for delivery in Japan, China and the Philippines. This vessel also carried flour, newspaper and other supplies for this district. Another shipment of interest this month is one of 2,800,000 feet of piling and lumber for Guaymas, Mexico. Shipments to this port have been quite regular during the past two months.

EWAUNA MILL INSTALLS NEW TAPER DEVICE

Ewauna mill installed a selective taper on the carriage last Saturday night. The new taper will allow use of the so-called Rhodes system of sawing, whereby the logs are sawed parallel to the bark rather than to the heart.

The advantage of this method of sawing is that all of the sap, which in pine contains the shop and upper grades, is saved, instead of being slabbled off.
