## Work Of School Nurse Is Lauded

Despite the fact that this was the first year a school nurse was ever employed by the school board, a report which was filed in the office of Superintendent J. Percy Wells by Miss Agnes Covalt, shows a great scope of work was accomplished.

Early in the year the County Health Unit was organized for Klamath county, and in order to cooperate with this unit, Miss Covalt was placed under the direction of the county physician. Miss Covalt was paid a salary by the school board and her work was devoted to the city schools, and families represented in the city schools. In March Miss Covalt's health failed her and later in the school year she resigned her position, to accept a more desirable one and thus the work for the first year was considerably interrupted.
