### Fish Commission Given Authority To "Fire" Employees

SALEM, Ore., June 17.—The state fish commission has authority to discharge an employe at any time, and therefore has no right to sign away such right by entering into a contract with any employe for any stated period of time. Attorney General Van Winkle takes this position in an opinion relative to the employment of Hugh Mitchell as director of hatcheries, with whom the commission entered into a contract for four years at \$350 a month. The attorney general holds that the contract is invalid.

Mitchell was employed by the commission more than a year ago, shortly after the commission had dispensed with the services of E. C. Clanton. Mitchell had for 29 years been in the government hatchery service and refused to enter the state service except on condition that he be employed for a period of years.

### LIFE BELIEVED ON PLANET MARS

PORTLAND, June 18.—That conditions exist upon the planet Mars capable of sustaining living organisms of some description is the opinion held by A. E. Douglas, vice president of the American Meteorological Society, University of Arizona Phoenix, Arizona, who attended the meeting of the Pacific division of the American association for the advancement of science which began its sessions today at Reed college.

Director Douglas has made perhaps more photographs of Mars than any other scientist. His studies of the red planet of war have permitted him to make the following deductions which he claims is indisputable proof of conditions there:

"There is considerable atmosphere on Mars.

"The markings on the planet are green undoubtedly signifying vegetation.

"The actual temperature of Mars has been measured and found to be between the ranges which would be conducive to life. His latter is the most important of the discoveries and the latest.
