2000 GUARDS ON AUTO CARAVAN TO SEE CRATER LAKE

MEDFORD, June 20.—What is believed to be the largest motor caravan ever to enter a national park in this country, left Medford at five o'clock this morning when residents of this city, under the auspices of the chamber of commerce took approximately 2000 members of the Oregon National Guard as their guests on a week-end trip to Crater Lake. Escorted by a squad of state traffic officers accompanied by a dozen mechanics, the caravan left Camp Jackson at six o'clock, making a line nearly five miles in length. Each driver had his blankets and lunch for today, but the National guard will furnish food for the rest of the trip, and cots also which will be pitched at the Union Creek bivouac tonight, when the National Guard will put on an entertainment for its hosts. Tomorrow the caravan will battle through the snow to the rim of the lake, as far as possible by car, then by foot, returning to Medford Sunday evening.

Work Begins on Wlul-Kse Arena for Fights to Be Staged During Convention

Work was begun yesterday on an arena at Wlul-Kse for the staging of the boxing card to be held there Friday, June 26, at which New Orleans Frankie Murphy will do ten rounds with Jim Firpo Gorman in the headliner. Murphy can hit faster than Sammy Olson, who some time ago got a decision over Gorman in a ten-round go here, and the wise ones are picking him to win over the iron-jawed Gorman, whose ability to take 'em and keep coming was the marvel of fans who watched him perform here. The semi-finals should prove popular with the thousands of Indians expected at the convention as two of their number, Jack Crim and Wilbur Harrington, will be matched with opponents who beat them previously and who will try to repeat.

In the semi-windup Crim will cross gloves with Joe Coffman in a six-round go. Coffman has one win over Crim to his credit. Crim insists he wasn't in shape in his previous meeting with Coffman, and that this time it will be different—a statement which remains to be proven.

Wilbur Harrington will step six rounds with Heine Meyers who has also a win to his credit from a previous meeting with the Indian lad. Meyers is coming along rapidly under expert tuition and unless he allows Harrington to get set and uncock one of his well-known murderous wallops should be able to repeat.

Jimmy Sullivan of Chiloquin and Joe Walters of Chico, both 160-pounders, will be put on in a four-round curtain raiser.

Frankie Murphy is now at Wlul-Kse, where he will remain until after the fight.
