Another Mystery Now Stirs Kelso

KELSO, Wash., June 23 (AP)—Another mystery that has served to stir the people of Kelso, who already were aroused by the shooting no death last Friday night of Thomas Doherty, newspaper publisher, has been made public by Luke S. May, criminologist employed by Cowlitz county to investigate the Doherty murder.

The new development involves William Woodrich, a salesman for a motor company, who alleges he was stopped by an unknown man at the point of a gun at Third and Columbia streets, Kelso, 11:30 o'clock Sunday night, and ordered to sign a paper, the contents of which he did not know.

On Woodrich's refusal to sign the unknown man walked away with the threat "you will sign these papers before this time tomorrow night or follow in the footsteps of another," according to Woodrich's story.

The man was described by Woodrich as more than six feet tall, wearing a brown suit of shabby appearance, dark soft hat, gray Hannel shirt, black shoes.

May said today that he discounted the partial identification made yesterday of the .41 calibre revolver found near the body of Doherty.

No Clues
"We have as yet found nothing tangible to work with," said May. James Spooner of West Kelso, yesterday partially identified the weapon as one he formerly owned. The investigation is being conducted by Deputy Prosecuting Attorney Quinn in cooperation with May.

A Roric Todd, former mayor, who returned yesterday and claimed the recall election which recently removed him from office was illegal delayed today's issuance of a proclamation formally claiming the office. He said he was waiting for the arrival of his attorney, John Casey, from Seattle.
