COOLIDGE WILL TAKE VACATION

President and Family Will Leave Washington, D. C. This Afternoon

WASHINGTON, June 23. (AP)—A cabinet meeting, perhaps the last to be held this summer, stood between President Coolidge and his vacation.

With his departure for the summer house at Swampscott, set for early afternoon, Mr. Coolidge devoted the morning to a last minute checkup with his cabinet and to arrange for a "Transfer of the major business of his office."

Practically every important pending question has been disposed of by Mr. Coolidge today, although a few appointments remain to be made and he still has under consideration some reports from the tariff commission recommending changes. An office has been set up for the president in Lynn, Mass., and with part of the executive force there, including Secretary Sanders, he will carry on such business there as arises during the summer.

Mr. Coolidge has not announced plans for his program while in Massachusetts, for a time however, it is expected, he will remain close to the spacious home at White Court, where he and Mrs. Coolidge will stay, resting from the cares of office. It is likely that they will remain on the Massachusetts coast until fall, breaking their stay with a visit to Plymouth, Vermont, the home of the presidents father.

Wagons Required To Have Lights On Night Drives

All horse-drawn vehicles traveling on a public highway after dark must display a light on the left side of the vehicle.

The above ruling, a state law, will be rigidly adhered to in Klamath county in the future, according to warning issued by County Judge R. H. Bunnell, who yesterday afternoon fined J. Baker \$1 for driving without lights.

"This law is for the protection of those who are out on the highway at night with a horse-drawn vehicle. No particular kind of light is specified in the law. A lantern, a flashlight or any other kind of light that can be observed for any distance will do. The main thing is the safety of the man in the wagon," today declared R. E. Knowles, county traffic officer.

Leaving the Pacific Highway at Grants Pass 45 miles of good gravelled highway is encountered. The worst part of the road is over Oregon Mountain, some of it narrow and under construction.

After crossing the mountain the heat road is declared to be along Patrick creek to its junction with Smith River, a distance of about 3 miles.

From this point on to Crescent City the road is in good condition, with the exception of some rough spots.

School Board Will Issue More Bonds

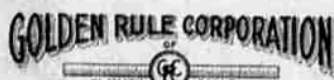

New Law Affects Those Who Carry Concealed Arms

Attention of the public to the new laws covering the carrying of concealed weapons was called today by Sheriff Burt Hawkins. His warning was issued because of the fact that many people habitually carry guns in their car during the summer camping season.

The law, while seemingly drastic stipulates that hunters and fishermen on camping or hunting trips may carry concealed weapons, both to and from their destination.

Any ex peace officer may carry a concealed weapon, if honorably retired.

Revolvers may be carried at any time providing they are in plain

sight in a belt holster.

Severe penalties are provided for any felon, or anyone with a previous criminal record, carrying a concealed weapon.

Any citizen whose reasons are found satisfactory may obtain permission to carry a weapon by applying to the sheriff or chief of police.
