Buses Will Run Here Soon, Note To Council Says

That W. E. Young of the Astoria and Linton transit company will be prepared to place his buses in operation here within the next few weeks was the information contained in a letter written to Otto Lorenz and read at the council last night.

Two 20-passenger buses are now completed and more are being built the letter said.

The council accepted the First National Bank bid of par with 5 1/2 per cent interest for \$9,037 Sixth Sewer Unit Deficit bonds.

The police judge was empowered to ask for bids for paving 9th street from Pine to High with hard surface, the ordinance passing its final reading last night.

An ordinance calling for bids for surfacing East Main street for a distance of one and one-eighth miles also passed final reading.

Freak Law Is Cause Of Grief For Assessors

A freak law passed by the last legislature is today the cause of a conference between W. T. Lee, county assessor and C. C. Mann, Lake county assessor.

The law states that in the case of stock which is pastured in more than one county, it shall be determined in which county the stock is wintered and in which it is located on March 1.

This county is then entitled to 60 per cent of the revenue received from taxation, while the county in which stock spends that portion of the summer after March 1 is entitled to only 40 per cent of the tax revenue.

The question, while theoretically simple, is proving a hard one in the case of Klamath and Lake counties where boundary lines mean little and where herds wander on the range at will.

Grocery Costs Here Less Than In Los Angeles

Klamath Falls prices on the necessities of life, particularly groceries, are on a par with prices for similar articles in Los Angeles, and in many cases even lower.

This is the declaration of Dr. J. G. Goble, who with Mrs. Goble returned yesterday from a tour through southern California.

"Oranges are cheaper in Los Angeles than here, but that is about the only exception," Dr. Goble said.

"Staple groceries are about the same, with the exception of sugar, which sold for a little less, the difference probably being accounted for by the freight. Rents were higher in most instances than they are here.

"I visited a son in the suburbs and failed to see where he effected any economies by virtue of California prices. Outside of the citrus fruits, there is little saving over local prices, even at the big markets."

Insurance Sales Pay School Cost For Klamath Man

Ivan D. Houston, who has just returned from Eugene, has a record of which he has reason to be proud. He worked his way through high school and the University, selling life insurance being one of his chief aids. In this line he won the life insurance sales contest before the state underwriters in Portland, sixteen contestants being entered.

He was one of the two debaters in the radio debate last winter, when Oregon won from Stanford. He also won the Bookman oratorical prize of \$100, gaining second place in the contest. Only graduates could enter this contest, the oration having to be original and delivered without manuscript.

Notwithstanding he had to work to make expenses, as well as being manager of his fraternity, the Phi Gamma Delta for two years, he made the highest grade of any of the six hundred fraternity men attending the University.

Mr. Houston will enter the insurance business in this city.

Road To Medicine Lake Blocked By Huge Fallen Tree

A large fallen tree is now blocking the road to Medicine lake, according to reports issued by a party of motorists who made the trip Sunday.

Medicine lake, comparatively isolated and teeming with rainbow, is located at the northern end of the Shasta National forest, in California.

The road, which leads through Merrill and past the lower lake, was declared to be in good condition by the party, although blocked within half a mile of the lake by the fallen tree. Members of the party left their car at the tree and walked to the lake.

By next Sunday it is believed that forest rangers now stationed in this district will have removed the obstruction.

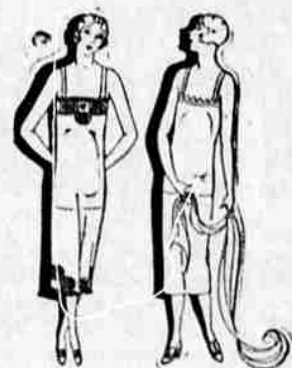
