H. E. Christie of the Christie Lumber company at Kirkford, is in the city today on a business trip.

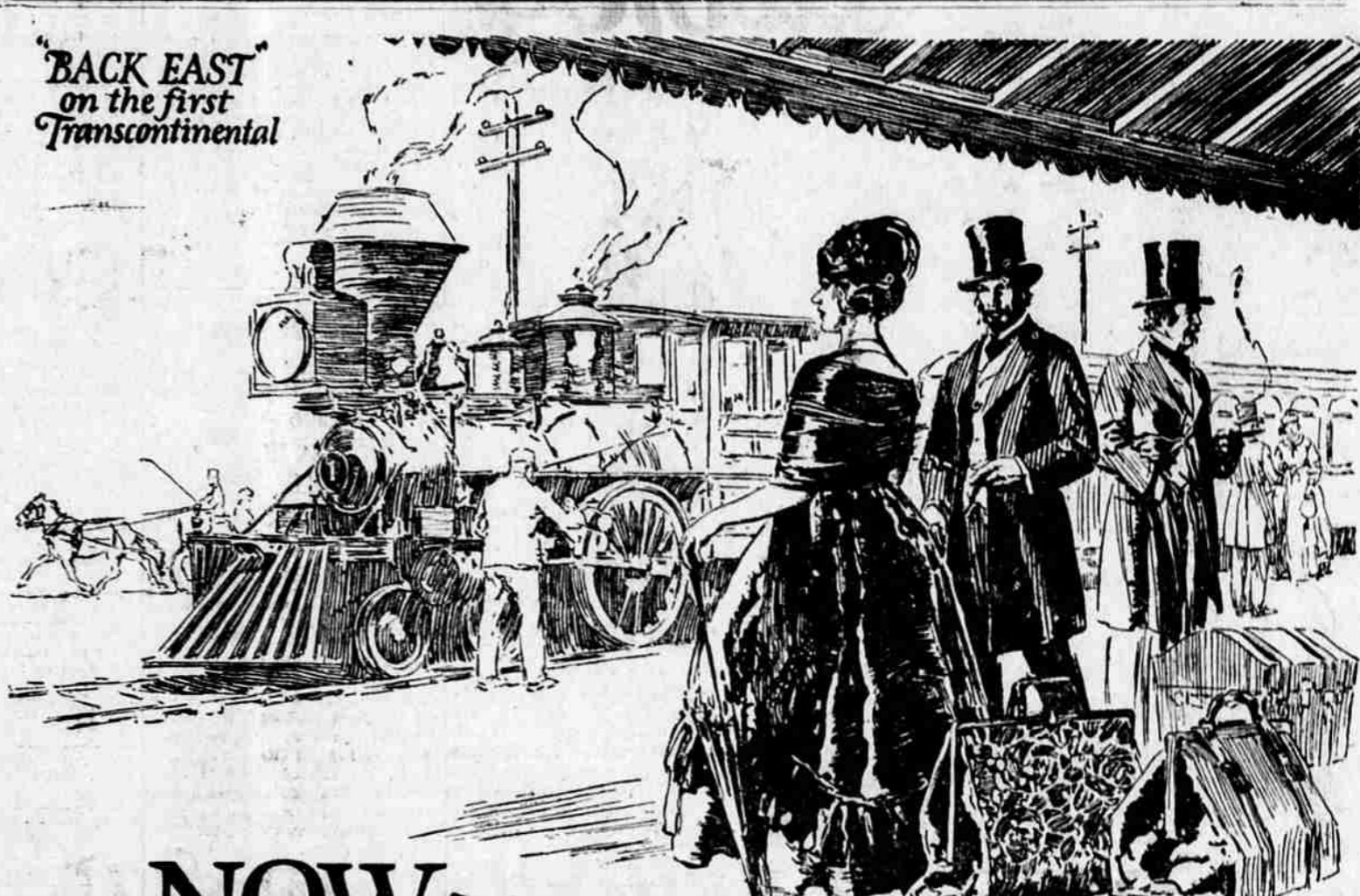
MERRILL PEOPLE PARENTS
