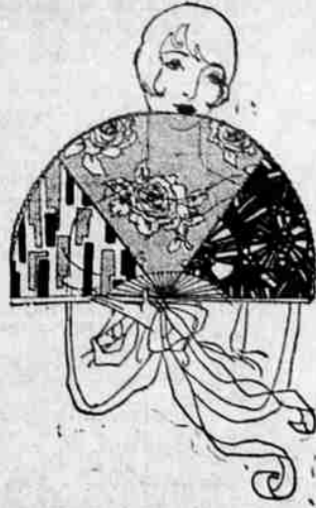

K. K. K. Store To Give Scholarship In Dairy Class

To the club boy or girl who wins Class III Dairy Division at the coming County Fair, will be awarded a scholarship to O. A. C. Summer School, Corvallis, in 1926. This coveted prize is offered by the K. K. K. Store who last year gave a similar award in Div. III of Pork Production. Ralph Hill, of Merrill, captured the prize last year with his Poland China boar.

The requirements of Class III specify that the prize winner must care and manage one or more dairy females of any dairy breed, dropped before August 1, 1923, for a period of at least six months, during which time records must be kept for at least one month before freshening and at least four months after freshening—the latter to include milk production.

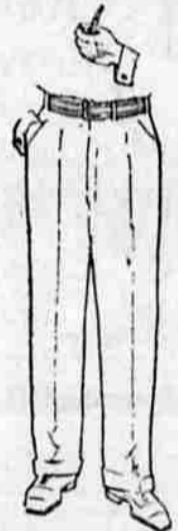
