

PLANES WILL GO AT HIGH SPEED

NEW YORK, June 29.—Two bi-planes, which will try to establish new records with a speed of 400 miles an hour, are now under construction and will be entrants next October in the Pulitzer trophy races, according to Dr. Otto A. Koller, German aeronautical expert, stopping at the Hotel McAlpin. The present record of 266 miles an hour which he expects his planes to break is held by Lieut. Alfred J. Williams, Jr., of the United States Army Air Service.

Dr. Koller, who is the inventor of the Albatross type of pursuit plane used by the Germans in the world war, said that the biplane he is building are of the small pursuit type, with specially shaped wings of his own design. They will be constructed to provide the least possible air resistance.

"They will be in accordance with specifications and plans I drew last year while making tests for the German Government in conjunction with the University of Göttingen," he explained. "One will be of 520 horse power, capable of making more than 300 miles an hour; the other, in which I expect to break Lieut. Williams' record by fully 100 miles an hour, will be equipped with an 800 horse power engine."

Both planes will have wing spreads of only thirty-six feet and widths of only seven feet from propeller to rudder, he said. They are designed to carry one man, besides fuel, oxygen tank, ammunition, parachute and other equipment.

Dr. Koller is interested also in commercial flying and is building several commercial planes at Halem, Pa. He stated that he planned to embody several new features in these, one of which would allow

planes to rise and land easily on the roofs of large buildings.

"He said he believed that both this country and Canada will develop commercial aviation rapidly. He declared that America is behind Europe at present in aviation development."

"Europe is honeycombed with passenger and mail routes by air," he said. "In Germany, for example, a timetable of 110 pages is needed to tell you when the interurban air-planes arrive and depart. With all the wealth and progressiveness of Americans, it needs only the proper designing and increased production to make the United States a world leader in commercial flying. American airplane motors are already famous in Europe; the combination with European construction skill should work wonders for American aviation."

Strike Situation In China Better; Stores Bankrupt

SHANGHAI, June 29. (AP)—With the exception of shipping, the strike situation was improved here today. Eighty per cent of the stores, closed during recent disturbances, have reopened. Those remaining closed were apparently bankrupt. The shipping strike is causing losses to the Chinese movement and the severely acting British and Japanese trade.

Fifty representatives of Chinese students unions from various parts of the country here yesterday, proposed a resolution urging the Canton government to take military possession of the foreign settlement at Canton.

JAZZ CREDITED AS PROMOTER OF INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS

ROME.—Those maligning American inventions—jazz music and racing, constitute far more potent agencies in the cause of international understanding between America and the nations of the old world than suave diplomatic overtures and lengthy and flowery after dinner speeches.

Such is the opinion of a number of thoughtful Italians who, after visits of varying lengths in the United States, have attempted to explain to their countrymen the importance of understanding American modifications of culture and social conventions of Europe. The dance floors of the large

tourist hotels of Europe, it is asserted, far from being the scene of undesirable meetings of young people, now are places where young American girls, properly chaperoned, meet young Europeans of the better classes. In the meetings of these young people, in their conversations and discussions, there is being brought to Europe the spirit and meaning of America.

SENTIMENT OF AMERICANS SAVES DUTCH WINDMILLS

AMSTERDAM, Holland. (AP)—Native lovers of old Dutch windmills have been much gratified and encouraged, in their efforts to preserve the characteristic feature of the Dutch landscape, by the lively interest taken by American newspapers and magazines in the reports that many historic mills would be threatened by demolition, or might be displaced by prosaic oil or electricity-driven machinery.

"The Dutch Mill," the society which aims at the preservation of the familiar skyline of the classic Dutch landscape, has received many sympathetic inquiries from Americans regarding the fate of the windmills. One letter from Topeka, Kansas, asked for a specification of a typical Dutch mill, with the object of erecting one there.

So insistent has the outcry become against the unnecessary demolition of mills, that it may now be hoped that most of the remaining ones will be saved.
