Tilling to be satisfactory in heavy weather must handle half an inch an acre of rainfall every 24 hours. In unusual storm periods the O. A. C. experiment station field tiles have run off as much as an inch an acre in one day.

Vegetables that are irrigated at the O. A. C. experiment station by running the water in furrows along the side of the plants are tomatoes, sweet corn, rhubarb, cucumbers, melons, beans and squash, and such general crops as are grown with rather a wide distance between the rows.
