LIGHTNING FOREVER UNLEASHING STUPENDOUS STORE OF POWER

LONDON, (P)—Scarcely a second passes, year in and year out, winter and summer, when there are not at least 100 lightning flashes somewhere in the world, according to the recently issued Blue Book of the meteorological office of the British government service.

During a year, says the book, the world experiences 15,000,000 thunder storms, or an average of 44,000 a day. The amount of energy released by these flashes is too stupendous for the human mind to grasp, the book points out. It is suggested by the meteorologists that the water power of the earth, which has already been harnessed by use as a measure. Figuring on that basis, it is estimated that double that amount is represented by one flash of lightning, consequently in any given second there is released from the clouds more energy than the world's water power stations yield in six months.

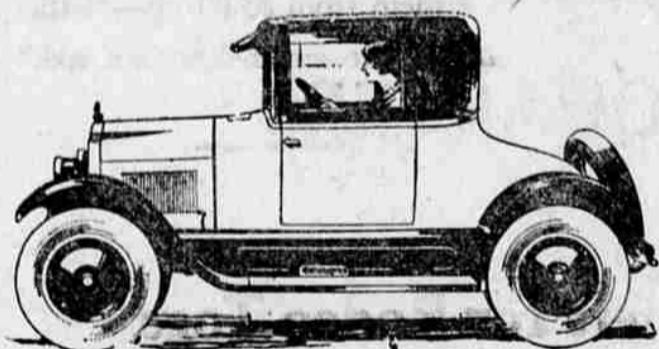

COST OF EXECUTING TWO ESKIMOS WAS \$20,000 AUTHORITIES SAY

EDMONTON, Alta., (P)—Authorities here have placed \$20,000 as the cost of the trial and execution of two Copper Eskimos, Alkomiak and Tatamigana, on Herschel Island a year ago. Knud Rasmussen, arctic explorer, differs from this estimate and puts the cost between \$50,000 and \$75,000.

Commenting on the Copper Eskimos, Rasmussen expressed the opinion that before law enforcement is undertaken efforts should be made to educate them to an understanding of the law of civilization. He pointed out that the Copper Eskimos were in a state of primitive savagery. During hard times killing of female children is customary, and the slaying of a husband to obtain his wife is not regarded as a serious wrong.

BLUEBOTTLE FLY BREATHES TO ENTERTAIN SCIENTISTS

LONDON, (P)—A large bluebottle fly was the center of attraction at an assembly of members of the Royal Society, who witnessed the working of an instrument called the Shakespeare katharometer with which it was possible to measure the fly's respiration. It is claimed that the katharometer can measure also, the breathing of a plant, find the water vapor in the air and detect the most minute leakages of gas in the envelopes of balloons and airships. Tests are to be made to determine its value in medical research.

Comfortably accommodated in a glass tube, the bluebottle fly was brought to London from Cambridge. After being inspected by the scientists, fresh air was admitted into the tube and the insect was seen to take deep breaths, much to the delight of the audience, who realized that the breathing performance of the bluebottle fly would provide ample

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opportunity for the instrument to show its worth. At the same time, it was announced, the staleness of the atmosphere inside the tube was also recorded by the device.
