TO GET APHIDS ON BEANS EARLY SPRAY IS NEEDED

The appearance of black aphids on beans and squash and green aphids on cabbage and kale is often sudden as to astonish the grower. It seems to him that almost overnight his clean, fine-looking vegetables have become fairly "blousy". and must now be sprayed with disinfectant.

coloring liquids that spoil the bright clean look.

This seldom happens just that way, at least in Oregon, the experiment station finds. Growers who think they had no chance to get the pests before they began swarming over the leaves and pods simply overlooked their best chance—putting on the early spray.

Such heavy infestations are usually the result of long-time colonization. Very early, when the plants

were quite small, they were visited by a few "pioneer" members of the aphid clan. These propagated slowly as the plants grew, until a powerful though inconspicuous generation of prolific breeders was well established. These were largely on the underside of the leaves and could be seen only by careful inspection. Sometimes it is only a leaf here and there that is infested, and the grower might lift and examine several of the lower leaves without finding

them.

Hence the desirability of early sprays—preventive, largely, for black aphids on beans and squash, and green aphids on cabbage and kale, in all districts where these pests attack. If this early spray is thrown against the underside of the lower leaves a little before the beans and squash start to vine, it is doubtful whether the pests ever overtake the plants until the heat of the crop has been picked.
