TEMBLORS STILL ROCK MONTANA

Gallatin River Valley Feels Additional Disturbance Last Night

BOZEMAN, Mont., June 30.—Southwestern Montana continued to keep its earthquake eye open today with the receipt of news late last night that shocks still were being felt near the scene of the disturbances of Saturday night and Sunday.

The Gallatin river valley stirred restlessly all day yesterday and distinct shocks were felt here at 10:30 and 11:35 o'clock last night.

Last night's shocks drove people from their beds and many spent the remainder of the night out of doors.

Dozens of shocks have been felt between Bozeman and Three Forks, one of the three towns which suffered most, since Saturday night. A shock at 3:30 o'clock Sunday afternoon, rattled over the weakened walls of a school building at Manhattan, which was partially wrecked Saturday night.

The shiftings of the earth's surface yesterday were felt at Great Falls, Helena, Billings, Logan, Three Forks and Manhattan, but no material damage was done.

Several hundred men are at work clearing miles of Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul railroad tracks in Sixteen Mile canyon near Lombard, which was buried by avalanches resulting from quakes. Traffic over the Milwaukee line still is impossible through that section, and its trains are being re-routed over Northern Pacific and Great Northern tracks.

Although the property loss at Manhattan, Three Forks and Logan still is estimated at \$500,000, some of the partially wrecked buildings can be salvaged it is said.

SANTA BARBARA GREWSOME SIGHT

One sagged crazily in front, its gable hanging two feet nearer the road than its foundation posts. Another had buckled in the middle and perched at the passing world through bay windows which until yesterday had been sheltered from the summer sun by an old fashioned veranda.

Immediately next door was a little home of two stories which looked much weaker in build than its neighbor, but here not a bit of damage had been done except to the chimney cap which had been catapulted into a bed of roses. Torrents from broken mains had bused through a number of home tracts burying gardens and side walks under a layer of mud several inches thick.

Sleep Outdoors

Nowhere, or only in very rare instances did the men, women and children of Santa Barbara spend a night within doors. Many whose homes were wrecked were forced to bed down in the open under the segment moon. The remainder slept on their lawns from cover, not knowing when a fresh sixth tremor might bring their belongings down about their ears.

Two facts stood out from many striking features in this city today. One was the continued, determined calm with which its citizens faced their destiny and their duty, and the other was the absence of any serious fire, which in earthquakes elsewhere had added to the horrors of stricken communities.

Plan Reconstruction

Early today the leading bankers and businessmen of Santa Barbara plan to meet in general session and

outline the reconstruction. Last night they started the program by raising \$10,500 in ten minutes at a hastily summoned assembly to finance the clearing away of wreckage.
