NEW THEORY AS TO QUAKE

EUGENE, Ore., June 30.—The Santa Barbara earthquake was probably caused by a shift in the earth's structure, along an old fault past the vicinity of the Santa Barbara Islands, about 60 miles west in the Pacific ocean, said Dr. Edwin T. Hodges, geologist, of the University of Oregon, in an interview today.

There is an abrupt change in the coast line in this vicinity from east and west to north and south, and at some former time the land was upheaved or the bottom of the ocean dropped. Dr. Hodges advances the theory that some action again took place here.

The shock came as a result of the quake in Montana, according to Dr. Hodges' theory. The theory of earthquakes, he points out, is that a tension created slowly, is suddenly removed by an abrupt parting of sedgements of the earth, and the relief of tension at one point causes a tightening and consequent break at another point. The weakest point usually breaks, hence Dr. Hodges' theory that the fault near Santa Barbara developed again.

The two shocks, coming a minute apart, were explained by Dr. Hodges as the result of two earth waves traveling from the place of action. One wave, a deep wave, travels fast, while the surface wave is slower. The fact that the shocks came a full minute apart denotes that the action took place some distance from Santa Barbara, he says.

There is little or no possibility of an earthquake damaging Oregon, said Dr. Hodges. Oregon lies between two earthquake zones, one to the north, which veers off in two angles, one to the southwest and the other to the southeast, and the other zone to the south, which swings out to the northwest at a point not far from San Francisco. Oregon lies in what Dr. Hodges describes as a submerged area, with no faults liable to quake activity.

Dr. Hodges has studied the coast area in regard to relation of earthquakes and the results and based the theories on his investigations.

Former Attorney General Is Dead A. M. Crawford, Portland Lawyer, Succumbs While on Fishing Trip

PORTLAND, Ore., June 30.—A. M. Crawford, prominent local attorney and for twelve years attorney-general of Oregon, died early today while on a fishing trip to East Lake, south of Bend, according to word received here from W. T. Slater, one of Crawford's companions. No details were received. As Mr. Crawford appeared to be in good health when he left here his friends believe he may have died from a heart attack. Mr. Crawford was a member of the firm of Crawford & Crawford here.

He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Florence Crawford, and a son, James Crawford. The funeral will be in Portland. Mr. Crawford was born in Cannonsville, N. Y., January 29, 1853. He moved to Portland in 1880 and married Miss Florence Watson of Roseburg in 1885. He was receiver of the United States land office here from 1890 to 1894, a member of the house of representatives of Oregon in 1897 and attorney general of the state from 1902 to 1914.
