### MANY EXPECTED AT BIG FIGHT

**Greb-Walker and Weinert-  
Wills Battles Will Draw  
at Least 50,000**

NEW YORK, July 2. (AP)—Some 50,000 followers of boxing are expected at the Polo Grounds tonight when eight famous fighters take part for good sized purses in a benefit for the Italian hospital fund.

A double headliner is offered. The welterweight champion, Mickey Walker, fights the middleweight king, Harry Greb; Harry Wills, negro giant, meets the rejuvenated

heavyweight, Charley Weinert. In the Walker-Greb tussle, Walker cannot lose his title because his opponent will enter the ring far over the welterweight limit. But Walker may win the crown that the Pittsburgh man took from the head of Johnny Wilson.

#### Greb Is Favorite

Greb is the favorite, for he has speed, power and courage considered sufficient to offset the brilliant attack that is sure to come from the sturdy battler from Jersey.

No championship will be at stake when Wills and Weinert face each other, but the ambitions of either may be shattered. Far in the offing—very far it would seem—looms a bout with Dempsey. Wills has fought the opportunity for years. Weinert would cherish the chance. Each has conquered the man who

a few years ago sent Dempsey hurtling through the ropes, Luis Angel Firpo.

#### Kearns Status

The State Athletic Commission has been called on to decide many issues in connection with this stupendous program—the question of postponement from June 19, found necessary when Walker suffered an injury in training. The question as to which is the feature bout, a matter still in the balance, and the status of Jack Kearns, who, it is reported, even will agree to a Wills-Dempsey match in order that he may gain admission to the grounds to second Walker tonight. Kearns has been notified that he will be barred from the grounds, because he ignored a challenge by Wills.

Little Joe Lynch, one time champion of the bantamweights, will fight four rounds against his old time rival, Jack Sharkey, in the first contest of the night.

### Ritchie and Murphy Signed for 10-Round Main Event at Scandinavian Hall Saturday

If Earl Ritchie, Klamath heavyweight, is really sincere in his desire to come back as an aspiring and perspiring leather pusher, he can win a home and a well filled money-bag for himself at Scandinavian hall Saturday night by taking the measure of Frankie Murphy of New Orleans, one of the best light heavyweights in the science of sock and take.

Ritchie's star twinkled out here a couple of months or so ago when the aged and erratic Rocco Strambo rocked him to sleep in the second round of a scheduled 10-canto go. He hasn't fought since then, but he's been doing a bit of real training and has been standing up against the big boys in the gym and had learned to take 'em, which is one of the essentials for the big boys.

On paper this looks like the best main event put on here since boxing was revived early this year. Ritchie, despite his recent setback, has a lot of followers, while Murphy's reputation is good, and his fighting is a known quantity.

In the semi-windup Johnnie Carlson will meet Kid Starkey in a 5-round fracas. Carlson is a clever boxer while Starkey is of the slugger type. A boxer and a slugger always put up a battle that pleases the cash customers.

Wilbur Harrington, the Indian box-fighter, will renew his feud with Heinie Myers in a four-round argument, while another four-rounder will be added, Mateo Baker Brownie said today.

Contrary to previous reports, the card will not be held in any tent. It will be staged at the usual place in Scandinavian hall, and will start promptly at 8:30 Saturday evening. Tickets will be \$2.20, \$1.65, and \$1.10.

### Labor Crisis Held Brewing

NEW YORK, July 2. (AP)—Serious labor crisis threatens the coal mining industries of both the United States and Great Britain.

John L. Lewis, president of the United Mine Workers of America, has publicly denounced the "infamous conspiracy" in the bituminous fields to break the miner's union, declaring that unless the existing Jacksonville agreement is carried out, a national shutdown of soft coal mines may be ordered.

In England a big strike threatens following formal notification by the mine owners of their intention to terminate the present agreement—a move which Secretary Cook of the miners' federation characterizes as a "declaration of war."

### Ad Telegraphed Coast To Coast

SAN FRANCISCO, July 2.—The first advertisement ever flashed across the continent from the Pacific to the Atlantic coast by the newly invented telephotographic process was received in New York recently when the complete layout and text of an advertisement from the California Pear Growers' Association was wired from the San Francisco office to the New York office of N. W. Ayer & Son, Philadelphia advertising agency in seven minutes.

This advertisement was transmitted over the lines of the American Telephone and Telegraph company, being received in the form of a photographic negative exactly similar to that made only fifteen minutes before, 5300 miles away.

In making use of this process, which permits the instant delivery of any photograph, print, half-tone or line drawing across the total width of the United States, the California Pear Growers' association, through its advertising agents, is the first Pacific Coast organization to place itself in immediate contact with its eastern markets.

The apparatus, which uses a regular telephone wire, is so designed as to transmit a picture five by seven inches, which is received as a negative, and after photographic development of the usual sort is virtually indistinguishable from an ordinary photograph, being ready for newspaper or other reproduction. As films can be transferred while still wet, no time is lost in drying or making special sending plates.

#### MOVIES POPULAR IN BERLIN

BERLIN.—(AP)—There are now 317 moving picture theaters in Berlin with an aggregate seating capacity of 124,000. Five new screen theaters are in course of construction in the west end.

### BOY SCOUTS OF CHINA AND JAPAN TO MAKE EXCHANGE CAMP VISITS

TOKYO.—(AP)—Fifty Boy Scouts from Japan will go to China this summer to spend several weeks in camps there. At the same time some two dozen Chinese Boy Scouts will come to Japan for a visit. This plan of exchanging Boy Scouts with various countries has aroused considerable enthusiasm among the Scout leaders here.

It was stated that the Boy Scout organization of Hungary has begun negotiations with the Japanese organization with the view of exchanging visits. The Hungarian Scout officials propose to send 50 Boy Scouts to Japan next year if a return visit of Japanese Scouts can be arranged for the following year.
