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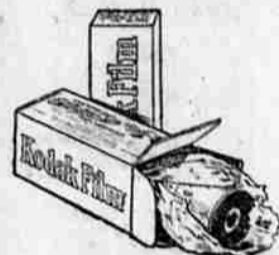

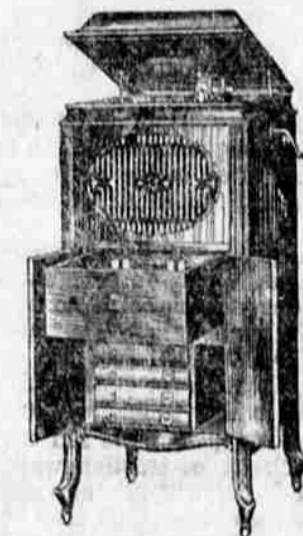

MOVEMENT TO HAVE NEW CRUISER NAMED HAWAII

HONOLULU.—One of the new large cruisers to be built for the United States navy may bear the name of Hawaii. Governor Wallace R. Farrington announced that he had proposed to C. D. Lufkin, president of the Associated Chamber of Commers of Hawaii, that that organization bring the suggestion before the secretary of the navy.

It was learned also that Representative Burton French, of Idaho, a member of the house committee on appropriations, who visited Hawaii recently, has written a personal letter to Secretary Wilbur, expressing himself in favor of the suggestion.

SPEEDY PLANES WILL BRING BOMBAY CLOSE TO LONDON

LONDON.—(P)—All steel airplanes now under construction here will make the trip from England to India, roughly 8000 miles as the crow would fly, if he were able to accomplish it, in three days and some odd hours, according to recent announcement of the air ministry under whose supervision the machines are being built.

The specifications provide that the planes be equipped with three motors developing 2000 horsepower, and it is hoped they will be able to accomplish 100 miles an hour and possibly even a greater speed. A crew of four or five will operate each machine, which will carry 20 to 25 passengers. It is proposed that these giants of the air travel day and night, there being sleeping accommodations, and hot meals by means of an electric cooker.

KING GEORGE HONORS PRINTER WHO GAVE BLOOD TO HOSPITALS

LONDON.—(P)—Bertie Wallace Tibble, a printer of Canonbury, North London, has been awarded the Order of the British Empire by the king, and also made a life governor of the London hospital, in recognition of his having given a pint of his blood on 51 occasions for transfusion to patients in London hospitals.

The usual fee for blood trans-

fusions is five guineas, but Tibble has refused payment, and he has therefore saved the hospitals an equivalent of nearly \$1335.

The official entry in the King's list of birthday honors read "O. B. E.—Tibble, Bertie Wallace. For public services in saving life."
