Station Agent Robbed of \$13 Night Operator for S. P. at Turner Victim

TURNER, Ore., July 2.—Duncan Lewis, night operator at the Southern Pacific station here, was held up at 1:30 this morning in his office by an unidentified negro, bound and gagged, and carried from the depot by his assailant, who locked him in a box car and returned and looted the till. The proceeds of the hold-up amounted to \$13.33. Lewis was released from the box car a number of hours later where he was discovered by G. Alexander, who lives in the vicinity of the depot. Lewis stated that the negro was unmasked. He entered the depot when Lewis was alone, demanding that he "stick 'em up."

Stearna of Portland (1853). BRITAIN'S TRADE PROSPECTS PAINTED IN DIMSAL COLORS

LONDON.—A gloomy view of Britain's trade outlook was expressed by Sir Robert Horne at a recent dinner of the British Overseas Banks association. He said he had just come back from a journey abroad, which had taken some months, and he was of the opinion "that we are in a worse position today than we were six months ago, and that was bad enough. If we look at the staple trades of the country we cannot help having a feeling of anxiety and apprehension as to the future."

Sir Robert referred to the state of the shipbuilding, coal, heavy steel, woolen and cotton trades, and said it was his deliberate belief that every section of society had to combine to find some solution of the problem, otherwise there was no hope for the country.

SWEDEN DRAWS LESSONS FROM AMERICAN ROADS

STOCKHOLM, July 2. (AP)—American road building experience, technique and machinery will be used in re-building and perfecting Sweden's national highway system in order to serve the country's ever growing automobile traffic. This has been announced here in connection with the opening next June of a special laboratory for the testing and selection of new paving materials. The engineer in charge, Ragnar R. Schlyter, has personally made a study tour through the United States.

Sweden spends 72 percent of the income from automobile taxes for the re-construction, widening or repaving of roads, 10 percent for new road building machinery, four percent for new bridges, two percent on new surface materials and two percent on research work. American methods of drainage have already been adopted in the southern part of the country and, allowing for differences in climate, the American style of surfaces probably will be followed. The scientists in charge have found that of all countries, the United States is the most advanced in the matter of making automobile roads.

LATE RAINS UPSET OUTDOOR MOVIE PLANS

LOS ANGELES, July 2.—Unusually late rains in southern California this spring not only damaged fruit and grain to some extent but also retarded film crops. Movie producers of Hollywood report a loss of more than \$500,000 due to the unseasonable rainfall.

After the middle of April film producers, expecting clear days, prepared for outside scenes. The late rains upset all calculations, forced important "takes" to be suspended and, in some cases, compelled the use of expensive indoor sets for pictures which could have been made more economically out of doors.
