JAPAN MAY RAISE TAXES

TOKYO.—In view of the excellent returns from the luxury taxes which went into effect last August, the department of commerce and industry is reported to be considering the enforcement of further duties. It is said that an increased import duty on watches is being contemplated, owing to the fact that the Japanese manufacturers are now turning out watches of a

quality comparable with the best foreign make. Graphophone records are also included in the list on which increased duties are expected to be placed.

CAIRO.—A committee has been appointed to organize an international navigation congress in Cairo. It will function under the direction of the minister of public works.

Serious Purpose Is Held Lacking In Most Students

INDIANAPOLIS, July 3.—The time, energy and "serious purpose" devoted to the specific training of pupils in citizenship is "pitifully inadequate," H. C. Morrison, professor of education at the University of Chicago, declared today before the National Council for the Social Studies of the National Educational Association at its annual convention. "All education is in a sense training for citizenship," he said, "but it is a pity to lose sight of a definite and specific need in vague optimism that if an individual has passed through school he has thereby somehow become an intelligent citizen."

"A pupil ought not to graduate from high school without an intelligent understanding of the application of politics to popular rule and of the menace of the demagogue."

Mrs. C. Cadwallader, of Waterloo, Iowa, before the School Garden Association of America stressed the need of outdoor work and the value of garden training in later life.

P. W. Hutson, assistant professor of secondary education, University of Pittsburgh, discussing "The Preparation of Teachers of the Social Study in the Field today," said "the teacher of social studies should have a well-rounded training, including history—ancient, European and American—and the three social sciences."

The work of public school children of Louisville, Ky., in nature gardening was discussed by Miss Emilie Yunker, supervisor of nature gardening in Louisville. More than 32,000 packages of flower and vegetable seeds, she said, have been distributed among the children to use in the school or home gardens, and the children enter into competition throughout the year in this work.

PRINTERS VOTE INCREASED TAX FOR MAINTENANCE OF HOME

INDIANAPOLIS. — (P) — The yearly income of the Union Printers' Home in Colorado Springs will be increased about \$55,000 as the result of a favorable vote by members of the International Typographical Union on the question of a ten cent increase in the monthly per capita tax for maintenance of the home. The union members gave the proposal a majority of almost 15,000.

The additional money will be used to complete and equip an addition to the home and for maintenance. Helpless patients, who have not previously been eligible for admission, will be cared for under the enlargement plan.

make me just as big as anybody." Connors said "I don't need a gun; I've got a pair of pliers."

Husbands Waiting

"We started for the car and I saw Mr. Howard and Mr. Vaughn reached for his hip and Mr. Howard hit him and I ran and hid. I was scared to death."

Howard told of how he had seen his wife and Mrs. Hughes start for Vaughn's cabin and how he had discussed the situation with Hughes before the men decided to go to the cabin and wait for their wives.

"I said, 'There they go now,'" said Howard, "and Hughes replied, 'Yes, and they are going over on a booze party down to Walter Vaughn's.'"

"I said 'There will be no booze party.' At the turn I found the car and I was standing there waiting when I heard them talking coming toward the car and when they walked up, Mr. Vaughn and my wife were in the lead and he had his arm about her waist and I jumped around the car and said, 'Now I've got you, you ———'"

"Cracked Him One"

"Just then he reached for his hip pocket and I cracked him one and he dropped. I hit him with my left hand and I had no rock or club when I hit him."

Hughes told Wright, according to Wright, the day following the trouble that he knew about the trouble but that he did not want to discuss it.

"Then I asked him," said Wright, "if he had anything to do with the trouble and he said, 'Yes, I did in a way. I hit Vaughn. My wife was out there so I cleaned up on them. Connors turned his head and I hit him in the back.'"

Dr. E. J. Cornish performed an autopsy Monday and declared that Vaughn had died from a multiple fracture of the skull on the right side of the cranium, inducing progressive meningitis, or inflammation of the lining of the skull. He said that he thought the blow that caused death had been caused by an instrument on the type of a hammer or a rock and that while a blow from a fist or the striking of the skull against the ground might cause such a condition, it was hardly probable.

"An Awful Blow"

Dr. Cornish's statement was borne out by that made by Lawrence C. Thompson, who was passing with his wife when the trouble took place.

"I heard Vaughn fall," said Thompson. "It was an awful blow, it sounded just like somebody had been hit with a board."

The jury impaneled by Coroner Felix J. Kunz returned a verdict that Vaughn had died from the effects of a multiple fracture of the skull, followed by meningitis, caused by a blow administered by "a party or parties unknown."

Many Enjoying Diamond Lake

DIAMOND LAKE LODGE, July 3.—(Special to The Herald.)—Diamond Lake Lodge opened officially July 1, for its fourth season. Many sportsmen and tourists have already been taking advantage of the splendid fishing which is said, by persons familiar with the situation, to be the best in the past five years.

During the past three weeks since the lodge has been open, Klamath Falls has contributed over twice as many guests than any other city. A greater portion of the visitors have been from southern Oregon points, although by far the greater part of the tourists have come from California, particularly Los Angeles.

Registered at the Lodge already this summer are names from England, Cambridge, Mass., Woonsocket, R. I., San Francisco, Long Beach, Oakland and Beverly Hills.

Most of the visitors at the lake so far this season have come for the express purpose of fishing. Few have been disappointed, most anglers have been rewarded with ample catches. Most of the fishermen are spinners, although a good many prefer fly fishing. Results seem to be about equal, with the spinners slightly in the lead.

A large crowd of visitors is expected over the week end of the 4th of July. Only a few small cottages are not reserved and it is expected that the Lodge will be taxed to the utmost to care for all the guests. Those who do not stay at the Lodge will find three miles of beautiful camp sites on the east side of the lake. These are free, and are under the supervision of the United States forest service, Diamond Lake being in the Umpqua National forest.

Entertainment over the 4th will include dances on the nights of the 3rd and 4th, music being provided by the Diamond Lake Saw Filers, an orchestra composed of boys working at the resort. Four University of Oregon boys, Don Woodward, Ted James, Harold Kirk and Edward Miller, one Oregon Agricultural college girl, Grace Corthel, and a Medford high school boy, Chuck Wakefield, have been recently added to the Lodge staff.

Recent visitors from the Klamath Falls district have included Mrs. D. H. Crump of Modoc Point and Miss Ethel Child of San Francisco, who is visiting Mrs. Crump, and who left Wednesday for Modoc Point.

Number of Klamath Falls persons have made reservations for the Fourth.

VANCOUVER, B. C.—Success in the use of airplanes to carry miners and supplies to mining districts near Fairbanks, Alaska, and in the Pacific northwest, has resulted in plans being made here for speeding up a stamped into the Cassiar country of northern British Columbia this summer over air routes.

Dog-sleighs and pack-mules were pitted against freight-carrying airplanes for the time when the weather would permit prospectors to rush to Dease Lake.

Reports of rich gold strikes in the Cassiar were confirmed at the start of winter. Canadian police placed a ban on adventures making the journey, for fear of starvation during the severe winter and the possibility of freezing to death if an attempt was made to return to civilization.
