## Big Meeting of Stockmen Called Here

### Formation of Local Association Here Is Likely

A special meeting of Klamath county cattlemen to consider formation of a local cattlemen's association is called for Saturday afternoon, July 11, in the chamber of commerce rooms.

In connection with the meeting the following letter was sent out today by County Agent C. A. Henderson:

"In order to perfect a plan for more orderly marketing of cattle and to form a local Cattlemen's association, I have been requested by a committee of representative cattlemen to notify every cattleman in this territory of a meeting to be held Saturday afternoon, July 11th, at 2 o'clock at the chamber of commerce rooms, Klamath Falls.

At that meeting preliminary steps will be taken for the organization of a local cattlemen's association, with the election of officers for the coming year and perhaps the appointment of one or two committees on important matters relating to the cattle industry, that should be given attention at this time. Representatives of the California Cattlemen's association, very likely the secretary and manager, will be present to outline the working and plan of the association and to show us what this organization has accomplished to date.

The plan of marketing as outlined by that association has met with approval in California, Arizona, New Mexico and southern Oregon. At present over 15,000 head of cattle have been signed by the association in this territory. In the states mentioned above, over a million head of cattle have been signed up and the actual selling of cattle started April 1st, 1925, and sales are increasing rapidly at this time. It is felt by cattlemen that greater returns can be secured by following this plan of marketing.

This meeting is very important and every cattleman in the county, whether or not he has signed with the association, should be present. While a large number of letters are being sent out, it is just possible that some cattlemen might be overlooked, so will you please use your best efforts to see that everyone is notified and request them to be present.
