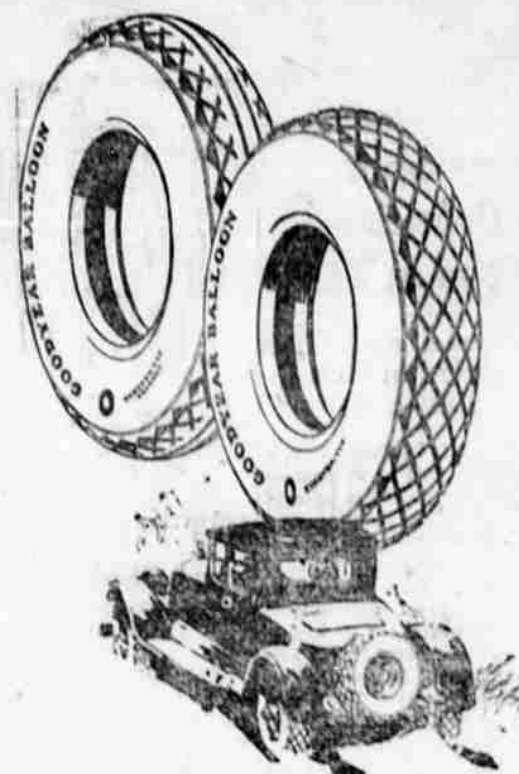

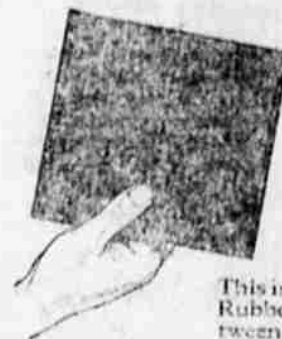
Saturday being the 4th of July the Camp closed down for three days, 3rd, 4th and 5th, but work resumed Monday the 6th.
