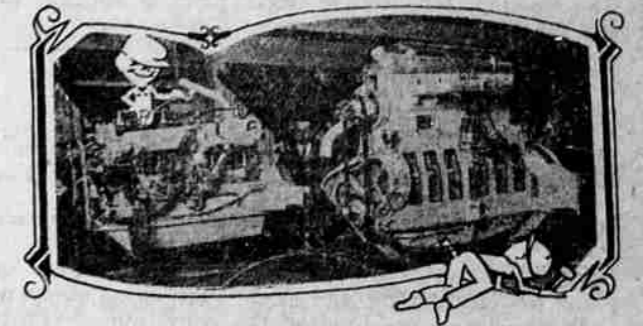

State Contracts Given By Board

SALEM, Ore., July 7.—Settler-green Brothers of Portland were successful bidders yesterday for the construction of a wing for the eastern Oregon hospital for the insane at Pendleton, the bid of that firm being \$178,865. A. A. Stewart of Salem got the contract for construction of a new building at the state institution for feeble minded with a bid of \$32,900.

Fox & Co. of Portland got the contract for plumbing at the Pendleton institution at \$7850 and J. P. Shea of Portland the heating at \$5137. T. C. Inman of Silverton will install the heating at the feeble minded institution at \$2803 and the plumbing at \$2709.75. Electrical wiring will be installed by the Hatch Electric company of Salem on a bid of \$720 and tile will be furnished by the Art Tile company of Portland, whose bid was \$4785.

The meeting of the board of control at which the bids were opened was enlivened by a clash between Governor Pierce on the one side and Secretary of State Kozor and State Treasurer Kay on the other. The governor insisted that contracts should be awarded concerns that operate under the state work-

men's compensation act, while Kay and Kozor insisted that the law does not require this. Kay accused the governor of doing more than anyone else to kill the compensation commission for the reason that he successfully opposed the legislature's plan to appropriate money for the commission for the present biennium.

Lofquist Found Guilty By Jury Of Non-support

John Lofquist was found guilty shortly before noon of a charge of non-support and on next Friday will be sentenced by Judge A. L. Leavitt. The trial was concluded at 11 a. m. and a few minutes after 11 o'clock the jury filed into the jury room. Joseph Daniels was found not guilty late yesterday afternoon of assault with a deadly weapon, after a trial which was remarkable for the speed shown in trying the case. Daniels was accused of shooting at another man three times, with intent to kill.

No other cases on the criminal docket will come up for trial until the first Monday in September, when Frank Way will stand trial on a charge of first degree murder. The Way trial will be followed by the trial of Harry Hamilton.

Owing to insufficient time to prepare for the cases the district attorney's office was unable to try the remainder of the cases on the criminal docket until September, and it is for this reason that they were set ahead until September.

POLICE RECOVER VATICAN JEWELS

ROME, July 7. (AP)—The police today returned to the vatican the precious objects stolen Friday night when thieves entered the treasury of St. Peter's. The stolen articles were recovered after the arrest of Mariano Stella, former shoemaker, and said to be responsible for the formation of the plot. The actual robbery was committed, the police said, by two painters who had worked in St. Peter's.

The two painters are Amerigo Leard and Rubicondo Primavera. These men had been working in St. Peter's and are under arrest. Stella is supposed to have had other accomplices among the workmen in the church.

It is said that Stella was seen about three weeks ago prowling around St. Peter's. Before the robbery Friday night he had been shadowed by detectives. After the robbery police commissioner Marotta, posing as a jeweler, opened negotiations with Stella for the purchase of gems. Stella, according to the police, carried Marotta to a shop where he exhibited all of the treasures taken from St. Peter's. By previous arrangement the shop had been surrounded by police and at a signal from Marotta they entered and arrested Stella and a jeweler, Luigi Graziani, Stella's confederate.

The vatican, when informed of the recovery of the precious pieces, sent Monsignor Bechini, treasurer of St. Peter's to police headquarters to convey the thanks of the Pope.

Evolution Trial To Start Friday

DAYTON, Tenn., July 7. (AP)—With the uncertainty removed yesterday as to whether Dayton was to be the scene of the trial climaxing the evolution controversy, Dayton looked forward to the arrival today of William Jennings Bryan, who is one of the prosecution counsel in the Scopes trial to be held here Friday.

Mr. Bryan will be met by other members of the prosecution who will attempt to prove John T. Scopes, Dayton teacher, guilty of violation of the state law prohibiting the teaching of theories of evolution.

Counsel engaged for the defense of Scopes yesterday in Cookeville, were denied their petition for a federal restraining order to halt prosecution proceedings scheduled for Dayton.

Federal Judge J. C. Gore held it his opinion that it was not within his jurisdiction to interfere with a case pending in a state court and expressed doubt that if it were in his power he would grant the petition on the strength of the allegations set forth. The constitutionality of the Tennessee statute, which Scopes is alleged to have violated, was not touched on by the judge.
