Floating Panels of Chiffon

The New Mode Introduces Pastel Chiffon in Combination With a Sheathlike Foundation of Satin



In a season where the mode is true to its selection of chiffon and laces for its formal gowns, it is only upon occasions that an evening ensemble of some distinct and picturesque type is seen. The chiffon evening gown in its delicate and appealing pastel tones is a delight to the feminine eye for its youthful charm and appeal, and it is very seldom that even crepe silk is used—except as a foundation—to infringe on the mode for fluttering chiffons. Blanche Sweet, in the first National film, "His Supreme Moment," wears an evening gown which is perfectly adapted to the season's smartest evening ensembles. Panels at the side, longer than the skirt, float gracefully from a slightly outlined waist, and are decorated to give the brilliance which Paris favors, with silver braid. A sheathlike slip of crepe silk is very simply cut, and possesses a low, round neckline and is without sleeves. The bottom of the skirt, which is different in its treatment—has its points finished with crystal beads. The floral decoration, which adds so much to the beauty of the formal frock, is placed low at the hips at the left side of the waist. The scarf, which is used alike on sports or formal frock, is used in unique fashion by Miss Sweet. It not only harmonizes with the treatment of oddly placed panels, but it also serves as a decorative shoulder scarf. It fastens from the left shoulder and drapes with casual grace either about the neck, or is hung about the arm. With the season still necessitating a light covering about the neck, the chiffon scarf is an accepted accessory. When attached to the gown it generally matches in tone, but when worn separately a contrast often lends smartness, as does the scarf of printed chiffon in floral design.

As the delegate sent by Underwood's pharmacy to the summer school of 1926, another miss will swell Frank Sexton's yearly delegation to Corvallis but—there's always a but!—she must first win the first prize in canning for the season just commencing in the standard boys' and girls' club work. Not only must she display at the county fair two jars of different varieties of fruit but a like display of vegetables as the four most representative jars from at least 20 quarts of canned fruit and twenty quarts of canned vegetables, which is the requirement for canner club work.
Now that the fruit canning season is approaching, Mr. Sexton, county club leader, is busy organizing standard clubs for the canner projects. His first enrollments came from Midland, where Mrs. J. B. Burnett has organized a club of seven or eight girls for whom she will act as local leader.
