Under this arrangement, assets belonging today to the farmers would have gone to the power company without the cost of one cent, except such money as it might have spent in bringing about such a result.

Church Convention Is Nearing Close

PORTLAND, Ore., July 8.—(AP)—With Cleveland, Ohio, selected as the meeting place of the biennial convention in 1927 and a successor chosen for the retiring president, Dr. Francis E. Clark, the work of the International Christian Endeavor society was largely over today. The remainder of the convention, which closes tomorrow, will consist in group religious meetings and appointment of committees.

Suggestions for inspirational and development work in the local organization also will be discussed.

EXONERATION OF WILSON AND HIS IDEAS SEEN BY GERMAN PAPER

BERLIN.—(AP)—Gradual exoneration of President Woodrow Wilson "whose reputation had been badly injured by the Treaty of Versailles," is pointed out by the Frankfurter Zeitung in its review of a book compiled by Theodore Hahn covering the statements, writings and publications of the American war president.

The Frankfurter Zeitung says "this gradual exoneration is keeping pace with the growing realization of the dangers today besetting European politics by the very general disregard for his ideas. If the world wishes to live in peace it will have to return to Wilson's theories."

JOBS FOR WOMEN URGED IN CUBA

REGLA, Cuba.—(AP)—Cuban women need ampler protection and should be provided with an adequate means of making an honest living, Mayor Antonio Bosch said in making public a plea to merchants and employers of the city to employ women wherever possible.

Mayor Bosch has asked the city council to adopt an ordinance making it compulsory for department stores and other establishments where women's articles are sold, to employ saleswomen, 75 per cent of whom must be of Cuban nationality.

Noted British Auctioneer Dead

ADDLESTONE, Eng.—(AP)—Henry Stevens, one of Britain's oldest practicing auctioneers and a curio king, died recently at the age of 82.

Among the many curios which came under his hammer were President Kruger's hat and the waistcoat of King Charles II.

Stevens during his life time had sold every conceivable thing, including the late Lord Derby's great menagerie of more than 1600 animals and birds; the death mask of Napoleon; a piece of Queen Victoria's wedding cake; the spear that killed General Gordon, and one of Dick Turpin's pistols, and 24 out of the known 75 auk's eggs in the world.

NEW METHOD TRIED BY POLICE CHIEF TO CATCH AUTO BANDITS

NEW ORLEANS.—(AP)—Payroll bandits and other hold-up men who use automobiles to escape after downtown robberies are finding it harder to get away due to a system installed by Thomas Healy, new chief of police. Under the rule when a policeman discovers lawbreakers escaping in a machine he blows a long blast and four short ones on his whistle and nearby traffic officers stop all vehicles until further notice.

Payroll robberies have been common here this summer, averaging almost one a week and it was because of these crimes and the recent robbery of a jeweler's messenger of \$30,000 in gems as he came out of a downtown bank vault that the experiment was tried.

GERMAN BILL WOULD BAR BABY ACTORS APPEARING ON SCREEN

BERLIN.—(AP)—Children under three years of age will not be permitted to appear in moving picture films if a bill introduced in the Reichstag becomes a law.

The bill points out that the nervous and physical strain of facing the bright lights of movie studios is injurious to infants. The bill further provides that children between three and twelve years may not appear in films except by permit of police and school authorities.

French Life Savers Rewarded

FECAAMP, France.—(AP)—A Carnegie prize has been awarded to the Fecamp life-saving station, and silver and bronze plaques have been given to the captain and the crew of the Fecamp lifeboat.

Last February during a storm the Danish ship Norstierne, dismasted and unable to make port, was in a critical situation. The Fecamp lifeboat at great risk put to sea and saved every man on board the Danish ship.

Many Killed By New Heat Wave

NEW YORK, July 8.—(AP)—The second day of the heat wave which swept down upon the east from the middle west has caused at least nine deaths and dozens of prostrations.

Violent thunderstorms in most sections yesterday brought only temporary relief. Scores of buildings were struck by lightning. The electric lights at White Court were put out of commission and President and Mrs. Coolidge sat in darkness half an hour.

In New York city a temperature of 90 with high humidity killed one man and prostrated nine other persons. Three boys were drowned, a white youth giving his life in a futile attempt to save two negro boys in the Harlem river. One died in Hoboken, N. J., and two were overcome.

Lightning killed a motorcyclist who sought shelter from the rain under a tree in Medford, Mass. Three women and a man under the same tree were stunned.

A farmer near Wheatshaf, Pa., died of heart failure while firemen battled a fire in his barn, struck by lightning.

There were two deaths in Washington, the mercury being up to 105 on Pennsylvania avenue.
