**Suit Started to Get Money Lost in Bank**

**G. K. Van Riper Defendant in Action for \$15,000**

A suit which has been hanging fire for four years, was revived yesterday afternoon when the Klamath County School district brought suit against G. K. Van Riper, former county treasurer and the American Surety company which undertook his bond, for the recovery of \$15,000.

The suit dates back to 1921 when the school district sold bonds in the amount of \$30,000 to the Clark Kendall Co. for the financing of a school building in Chiloquin.

According to the complaint, Van Riper registered and certified the bonds but failed to turn them over to the purchaser, Clark Kendall & Co., and receive the money therefor. Instead, the complaint sets forth, he turned the certified bonds over to directors of the school district who in turn delivered them to purchaser and received the money.

The \$30,000 was deposited by the directors at first in the American National Bank, but \$15,000 was later transferred to the First State and Savings bank. When this institution closed its doors, the \$15,000 was lost to the school district.

It is for the recovery of this sum lost when the bank became defunct, that the school district is bringing suit. The district claims that Van Riper should have turned over the bonds to the Clark Kendall Co., received the money for the bonds and issued the money in warrants from the county treasury for the purpose the bond issue was approved. Robert Kuykendall, local attorney, is representing the plaintiff.

**Resurfacing Job Will Be Started Middle Of August**

Although the contract calls for completion of the job by next year, it is the hope of the contractors that cold weather will hold off long enough this fall to enable them to complete the job before winter sets in.

**Duck Season Will Open Week Sooner**

Duck and goose season will open this year one week later and close one week later, according to word received here today from Ray C. Steele, United States game warden.

Inasmuch as this is a federal game regulation and it is the policy of the state to follow the federal laws, similar announcement from the state game commission is expected in Klamath Falls within the next few days.

The new regulation stipulates that the duck and goose season will open October 1 and close January 15. The old law opened the season on September 15 and closed January 1.

Marion J. Barnes, district game warden, commenting on the change, stated that it would be a benefit to the wild life of Klamath. He mentioned that many birds are too young to fly the first of the season.

**Closed Season on Sage Hens**

"There is no open season on sage hens this year."

This was the announcement made today by District Game Warden Marion J. Barnes after answering several dozen phone calls from Klamath sportsmen that wanted to know whether or not they can shoot sage hens this year.

"The game commission declared closed season on the birds because they are rapidly becoming extinct," Mr. Barnes said. "I don't know at this time whether or not there is a closed season in California, but it is my understanding that there is."
