

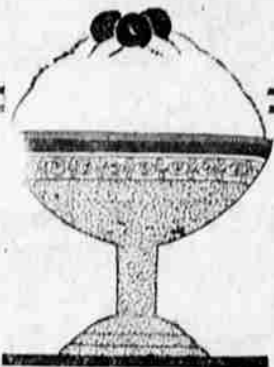

Dying Gangster Breaks Silence

Tony Genna, Chicago Beer Runner, Whispers Name of Assailant

CHICAGO, July 5.—Only the name "Cavaliero," spoken by the dying Tony Genna, and three theories in motives of his assassination guided police inquiry today into the latest upheaval in Chicago gangland.

Third member of his family to fall before bullets in six weeks, Tony yielded to entreaties of relatives at his death bed and broke the gangster's code of silence to gasp the name. And with this slight clue the police began gathering suspects for questioning and possible identification.

The interrogation of seven men, taken into custody last night, was based on police belief that rebellion among dealers and distributors against the Genna control of alcohol had caused the fatal shooting of Tony yesterday in the heart of Little Italy; or that the shooting was another act of reprisal for the murder last November of Dion O'Bannon, rival gang leader.

In the plea of Sam Genna, Tony's brother, for police protection, investigators saw grounds for belief that the entire Genna clan has been marked for death.

JAP PRINTERS' TASK IS LIGHTENED BY LESS CHARACTERS USED

TOKYO, (AP)—The Osaka Asahi and the Osaka Mainichi have agreed to limit the Chinese characters in use to 2,499 instead of the 6,000 odd formerly drawn upon by the compositors. Exceptions are to be made in the cases of imperial edicts, laws and proper names.

WATER SCARCE IN GOLD TOWN

TONOPAH, (AP)—Water is selling for five cents a gallon in the little boom mining town of Gilbert on the desert near here. The principal barber shop of Gilbert has a fully equipped bath tub but there is a sign that "Customers must furnish their own water."

YALE LECTURER AT BERLIN

BERLIN.—Professor E. M. Borchard, of Yale, recently opened a lecture course at the Berlin University. He said in his opinion his chief task consisted of re-establishing international scientific relations and preparing the way for the resumption of German-American exchange of professorships such as existed before the war.

ALASKAN HUNTERS MUST HAVE LICENSED GUIDE

SEATTLE.—Beginning August 15 non-residents hunting game animals in Alaska must be accompanied by registered and licensed guides, the Alaska Game Commission has announced. Persons not licensed have been prohibited from guiding non-resident hunters.

Formerly, licensed guides were required only for the Kenai Peninsula, between Cook Inlet and Prince William Sound, south of Anchorage, but the new ruling covers all Alaska.

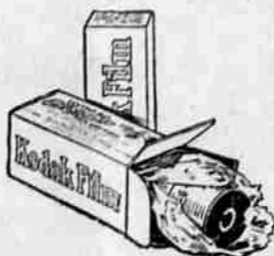

Only One Held As Result Of Tuesday Raid

One lone chipman is held by authorities as a result of the raid Tuesday night on an alleged gambling dive in which 41 were taken in custody. He is Jack Fong and was bound over to the grand jury on a charge of selling lottery tickets. He is held under \$700 bond.

Charges of maintaining a gambling game were dismissed against Mark Lin, Wong Fow, Jack Fong and Gong Fong. David R. Vandenberg asked that all four chinamen be bound over to the grand jury on the charge of gambling, but Justice of the Peace R. E. Hunsaker ruled that evidence was insufficient to warrant further prosecution by the state.

Sheep Concerns Contracting For Lambs For Fall

Active buying of young lambs by California concerns is now in progress and representatives of the concerns are contracting with sheep men for delivery of the lambs next fall.

Buying for the Union Sheep company of San Francisco, Charles F. DeLap of this city, has contracted for the purchase of 20,000 lambs that will be delivered as the San Francisco concerns calls for them. It is thought that the heavy shipments will leave Klamath and taper down through the months of September and October.
