HAG SAYS MODERN WAR EQUIPMENT

LONDON, July 10, (P)—Tanks and other motor equipment will not supersede the horse in the next war is the opinion of Field Marshal Haig. Acknowledging an honorary diploma as associate of the Royal College of Veterinary Surgeons recently, the Field Marshal expressed the opinion that the need of horses in future wars would be as great as in the past.

"We have heard a good deal about modern war inventions which are likely to supersede the horse," said the Earl, "but the production of these inventions invariably produces an antidote, and in order to gain the greatest efficiency in the long range of war appliances we will need well bred horses for a great many years to come."
