**NEW BUILDINGS
TO BE ERECTED
BY FAIR BOARD**

**Claims of Board and the
Rodeo Association
Considered**

PRIZES ARE OFFERED

**Free Hay to be Furnished to
Livestock During County
Exhibition**

At a meeting of the Klamath County Fair Board held Friday evening in the offices of the county agent, there were present R. E. Bradbury, E. M. Hammond, H. N. Moe, W. W. Southwell and T. W. Newcomb. The primary purpose of the meeting was the financial adjustment between the fair board and the Bly Rodeo association arising from the three-day celebration just passed but there being no representative or member of the Rodeo Association present, the claims of both parties were presented by the auditor, Mr. Southwell and discussed at length. It was voted that \$1,000 be allowed as two purses of \$500 each for

automobile and harness racing at the coming County Fair, in addition to a sum somewhat in excess of \$2,500 used for running, relay and chariot races last fall. Several inquiries from racing stables have been arriving and the racing program is being compiled by E. M. Hammond and will be on the press within a week.

New Buildings

As soon as plans for an exhibit house for poultry and pet stock are obtained, bids will be requested and the new structure be in readiness to receive exhibits by the time the fair opens. It was further ordered that the north end under the grandstand be adequately protected by rolling doors and that the garden produce, field crops, community exhibits, potato division and flowers be given space therein. This was made necessary by the crowded condition of the main exhibit pavilion last year and the willing of perishable exhibits, boys' and girls' club exhibits, domestic art, culinary and other delicate exhibits will have the entire space of the old show pavilion.

Cash Prizes

The sum of \$50 to be awarded in first, second and third prizes of \$25, \$15 and \$10 each, was unanimously agreed upon for community exhibits which were regarded by the fair board as making up a most representative, attractive and valuable part of the county's display. This is the first year that prizes for this particular division have been offered

and through the efforts of County Agent Henderson, it is hoped that the community clubs of Bonanza, Langell Valley, Merrill, Malin, Fox Valley and the newly organized association at Fort Klamath, may be induced to enter. Last year Malin was the only enterprising community to take advantage of this opportunity to show the world and Klamathians in particular what bountiful crops, luscious cheese and other valuable products she produces. As the pioneer in community exhibit work the Tule Lake Farmers' Club promises something this year to surpass her initial effort of 1923, which by the direction of A. E. Street, proved one of the most attractive displays at the County Fair.

Free Hay Furnished

It was formally decided that free hay would be furnished to stock and horses during the fair and grain for hogs and that racing horses would be provided with hay gratis one day before the opening of and one day after the closing of the County Fair, insuring their manager time to procure hay for a longer stay.

Space for industrial exhibits 16x16 feet on the west side and 16x14 feet on the east side of the lower arcade will be for rent to such firms, companies or corporations as may choose to put in an industrial or merchant's display. Since last fall the grounds have been re-wired so that a load for operating large mechanical working exhibits may be delivered and distinct effort will be made to interest many of the manufacturing and lumber concerns to install exhibits that will interest and intrigue the passing crowds.

There was general discussion regarding the future possibility of erecting a building for women's displays and club work, which would answer the purposes of a community meeting place and be of an income producing type by reason of rentals for social events. It was finally decided that funds did not warrant such expenditures this year and that it were better to wait until such building might be assured sufficient funds to make it complete for all requirements.

Owing to the absence of the manager of the local baseball team, no definite understanding or agreement regarding the use of the fair grounds could be reached. Showers for the ball players, dressing rooms and other conveniences have been installed and the high school ball and track teams have enjoyed these accessories during the past few months of practice and after games.

The fair board expressed themselves in favor of expressing a vote of appreciation to Miss Lorena Trickey for her part which they deemed a very large one, in making the recent rodeo a success and without which they did not believe the attendance would have reached the satisfying figure attained.

Several bills were considered and some passed upon favorably by the board, who ordered them paid as soon as money was forthcoming to meet them.

the most part, the potatoes are Netted Gems, which have been proved best adapted to Klamath soil and climate. Market for Netted Gems, seems assured, according to the county agent's office.

Dry land farmers, whose road to prosperity has been rocky and rough during the past few years, will have a prosperous year, according to reports. While the crops will not be sufficient for most of the dry farmers to get out from under still, it is thought that it will mean a ray of sunshine on a darkened horizon.

Best Range Year

Never, in the memory of the oldest livestockmen in the country, have range conditions in Klamath been so good. As a result of the heavy stand of the fattening bunch grass the livestock and sheep will have a good year. At this time the range grass in the lower reaches is beginning to dry up and the flocks of sheep and herds of cattle are gradually working their way upwards to the mountain meadows along creek bottoms.

Summing up the agricultural conditions this time, County Agent C. A. Henderson characterized Klamath as a garden spot. Reason for the remarkable crops is said to be two heavy rains in May, one .75 inches and the second 1.50 inches, which came at a time when seed was germinating and needed moisture.

**Sheriff's Office
Makes Report On
Tax Collections**

Steady work on the part of the sheriff's office has resulted in a record being hung up for collection of delinquent taxes, according to the semi-annual report of 1924 tax collections, made public today by the sheriff.

Day by day the sheriff's force of tax collectors has worked on delinquencies until on July 1 the books showed that tax delinquencies in the sum of \$35,476.23 had been collected since the first of the year. The delinquent taxes extend back as far as 1912 and run up to the delinquencies of 1923. Delinquencies collected for 1923 were especially high, with a sum of \$48,129.15.

Less than half of the taxes for the year of 1924 had been collected by July 1 of this year, the semi-annual report disclosed. The total 1924 taxes collected was \$469,449.45.

Taxes for 1923 amounted to \$989,899.53, which is slightly under the taxes for 1924, which total \$1,045,287.96.
