Everybody Swelters During Trial of Scopes at Dayton, Tennessee

DAYTON, Tenn., July 12. (AP)—A sultry heat permeated the Rhea county court room as the second day of the trial of John T. Scopes began today. Electric fans, lacking Friday when everybody sweltered, had been installed and played about in an effort to make the atmospheric conditions more endurable.

Judge Raulston, taking judicial cognizance of the weather, had changed his suit of blue wool to one of linen.

Blue uniformed Captain Perkins of the Chattanooga police, with a menacing expression on his face

stood by the judge's bench and waved a fan.

William Jennings Bryan, collarless and without a coat, had a tightly filled leather brief case as he moved to the prosecutor's counsel table. He seemed prepared for argument.

Benton McMillin of Nashville, former Tennessee governor, entered and began shaking hands all around the room.

Photographers were climbing like monkeys over the seats and benches and snapping their cameras at the occupants of the railed area. A movie cameraman ground out several colossal feet of Clarence Darrow on one side and Mr. Bryan on the other.

The jurymen sat with hands on chins, taking panoramic views of the expense of faces.

The opening of court was delayed several minutes while the picture taking brigade shot off its ammunition. The auditorium was again crowded to capacity and scores stood in corridors and along the walls.

At the entrance to the court house, boys laden with cushions posted themselves and peddled their wares to prospective spectators. They found few buyers however. Scores of persons, unable to find seats, returned to the court house lawn and grouped themselves about amplifiers.
