**Jones Is Busy
 Seeking Merit
 of Many Cases**

**Acting District Attorney
 Doubtful of
 Prosecutions**

With nearly 50 half-completed cases to investigate, Caleb Jones, acting district attorney, is busy unravelling a tangled maze of purported evidence with the view of dropping those cases in which prosecution would be a needless waste of time and money.

"Many of these cases that I have inherited from the last administration of the district attorney's office will probably be dismissed," he said today. "I feel that the state before taking a case into court should have at least prima facie evidence to give them some standing in court. Many of these cases lack that evidence, nor is there any way to secure it. So I feel that the best interests of the county would best be served by dropping cases of that description.

The district attorney declared himself set against utilizing his office as a means of satisfying a spite of one person against another.

"One man wants to get satisfaction, either personal or financial, from another person," he explained. "The complainant comes to me with a set of facts tending to incriminate the second person.

"Hereafter, as long as I am in office, I shall investigate thoroughly before issuing a complaint, and when the complaint is issued, it will mean that the case will be followed through to the end of the trial, unless, of course, unexpected developments arise that necessitate dismissal of the case."

**School Directors
 Proceed Slowly
 Getting Building**

Before the directors of the recently formed high school district of Chiloquin take steps to vote a bond election for the purpose of financing construction of a high school, they will devote some time to interviewing citizens of Chiloquin on the question.

This was the sense of a meeting of the directors held last Friday. It was felt that when such questions as a site, size of the school and amount of money to be expended, are settled that the board will go ahead with the bond election.

For next fall, at last, the new Chiloquin high school will in all probability be established in a temporary building, suitable for the purpose, it was said. Construction of the Chiloquin high school would probably start next spring.
