Swedish Fleet To Engage In Baltic Maneuvers Shortly

STOCKHOLM.—As a preliminary to plans for reorganizing the navy, there will be held in the Baltic this summer the most extensive Swedish naval maneuvers since 1914. The king will be in command.

The Swedish fleet at present consists of 11 vessels, of which 42 belong to the coast defense, 37 to local units and 32 to the reserve, included in the main fleet, designed entirely for defensive purposes, are 12 battleships, 10 destroyers, one armored cruiser and a number of torpedo boats and submarines.

In view of the impending reorganization, appropriations for this year were limited to the continuation of the building program decided upon last year. The future policy will depend partly on the political developments abroad and partly on the experience to be gained during the maneuvers.
