THREE PERSONS BADLY INJURED IN AUTO CRASH

Two Expected to Die as Result of Wreck at Derby Station, Near Salem

SALEM, Ore., July 16.—Three persons were seriously injured and two may die as the result of an automobile accident at 7:30 this morning when a car said to have been driven by A. McKabin of Salem crashed into a slowly moving train near Derby station in Polk county.

The injured are: Miss Eva Hopkins, broken leg, severe lacerations about the body, finger torn off, ear almost torn off; condition said to be very serious.

Miss Catherine Haltzon of Portland, practically scalped by lacerations about the head; probably fracture of the skull; condition extremely serious.

C. J. Ball, arm broken, nose broken; condition not serious.

A. McKabin, minor injuries.

Members of the train crew declare that the car was traveling at about 45 miles an hour when the crash came. The train had stopped only a short time before and was moving slowly when it was struck by the car. The machine was completely demolished. It had been rented earlier in the evening from a Salem taxi company.

Members of the train crew declare that McKabin did not see the train until he was within ten feet of it and that he made a desperate but futile effort to swerve the machine from the impending crash.

The accident is being investigated by Sheriff Hooker of Polk county and by officers of the Salem police department.

Work Would Cure Drunks, Opinion Of Chief Loucks

"Why should the city support all the canned food addicts in town? Why shouldn't they be made to earn their own bread and butter? What should be done with them?"

These and many other questions, following the same line of thought, are asked by Chief of Police Harry M. Loucks.

"I don't know what to do with them," he remarked yesterday. I have 15 or 20 in jail today. They will get out in a few days, proceed to get "canned" up and then the jail doors will open once more for them.

"Do they mind staying in jail? Hardly. It is a soft spot to fight. They get their meals free, a bed to sleep in and are among their own kind. They are placid and contented until they get out, then it is back to canned heat again.

"It is a problem that can only be solved by the city putting the prisoners to work and making them sweat some of the alcohol out of their systems. In this way, the prisoners would not be such a continual drain on the finances of the city treasury.

"It would be different, if a term in jail would be an object lesson to them, but it isn't. They don't care whether they are in jail or not. I wish, I could see my way clear to put them to work. They wouldn't be so anxious to come back the next time."

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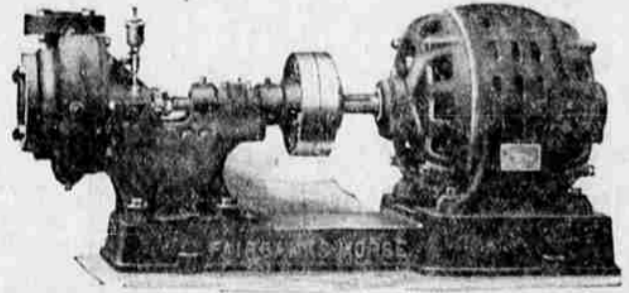
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Dempsey and Wills Signed

Broken Propeller Delays MacMillan

Radio Message Tells of Third Attempt to Repair Arctic Vessel

WASHINGTON, July 16.—(AP)—The crew of the MacMillan Arctic ship Bowdoin is having a difficult time repairing the broken propeller of the vessel at Hopedale, Labrador, Commander MacMillan reported in a radio message received today by the National Geographic society. It apparently was filed last night.

"We are making our third attempt to put on spare propeller." He said. "The evil spirit of the north, so familiar to the Eskimos, has temporarily turned all of his attention to the white visitors from the south. Unfortunately we are having tides with a rise and fall of only four feet. To raise our broken propeller above water we have shifted all the deck load to the bow of the boat.

"Even this failed to accomplish our object, therefore, tonight we placed four large empty casks under the stern of the Bowdoin, hoping that when the tide rises they will lift the Bowdoin at least six inches.
