**MOTOR TRAFFIC
BREAKS RECORD**

Siskiyou County Taking
Census to Determine
Amount of Travel

YREKA, Calif., July 17.—With the advent of July and the passing of school days, the tourist travel through Siskiyou county is growing so rapidly that all previous records for motor travel through northern California bid fair to be shattered. To determine approximately how many automobiles pass daily on the two principal arteries in Siskiyou, a check was kept Sunday at the bridge where the Klamath and Shasta rivers meet and where the Pacific highway continues northward to Oregon while the Klamath highway branches off to the west.

The check showed that an average of 120 cars passed a given point near the bridge in every hour between one o'clock and four o'clock in the afternoon; 105, four to six o'clock, and 100 from six to nine o'clock. While a heavy percentage of these were Siskiyou machines, the majority were tourists' cars and among the states that were represented were Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Montana, Illinois, Michigan, Arizona, New York, Iowa and while British Columbia was not without its representation.

From now on, the tourist travel in northern California is expected to exceed the records in bygone years. It is estimated that 70 per cent of the eastern and middle western tourist travel comes via the Columbia River highway which leads down the Columbia river from Idaho into Portland where the Pacific and the Capitol highways divert the travel southward through the Willamette, Rogue and Umpqua valleys. This steady flow of southbound travel is headed for San Francisco and Los Angeles and the major portion continues directly south over the Pacific highway while some parties are taking the Klamath highway to Eureka from Hornbrook and thence southward through the redwood forests.

While this flood of tourist travel is keeping the highways like runways busy with ants, the Yreka Automobile park is doing a land office business, according to R. W. Cheesbrough, manager. The record for the month was last week when 39 cars were checked in on one night, with ample accommodations, the park is proving a great inducement to tourists, as it is recognized as one of the best appointed parks on the coast and its fame has been broadcasted. In addition to managing the automobile park, Cheesbrough has demonstrated his ability as caretaker of the city hall grounds, which have never been more attractive than this season and which have attracted much attention.

Managements of the Yreka Inn, the Franco-American hotel and the Clarados hotel report that rooms are in demand and that it is difficult to find accommodations for transients while rooming houses have been filled for more than a month.

**Pacific Maneuvers
Prove Inadequacy
Of Hawaii Harbor**

HONOLULU, (AP)—Capt. R. M. Griswold, aide for material on the staff of Admiral Robert E. Coontz, commander-in-chief of the United States battle fleet, asserted while here that further proof of the inadequacy of the facilities of Pearl Harbor navy yard, and of the need for deepening the channel entrance to the keystone of American defenses in the Pacific, had been furnished during the final days of the fleet's visit to Hawaii prior to its departure for Australia.

Minor electrical trouble, such as ordinarily would be eradicated at a navy yard, developed on the U. S. S. West Virginia, one of the latest and largest of the dreadnaughts. Because of the vessel's immense draft and the fact that Pearl Harbor channel is not sufficiently deep, it was considered unsafe to attempt to send her into the yard. Naval officers were compelled to perform makeshift repairs at the West Virginia's anchorage in Rolling Bay, approximately a mile off Honolulu in open sea. It was necessary to anchor the 11 giant ships of the fleet here because of the lack of mooring in Pearl Harbor.

It also was discovered, Captain Griswold reported, that the yard was not equipped to make repairs to the

**Private Capital
Sought To Help
Soviet Industry**

MOSCOW, (AP)—Problems of internal trade are now engaging the closest attention of the Soviet government. The recent conference of the Communist Party and the Federal Congress of Soviets passed a number of reforms to facilitate private trade and to attract private capital to general trade and industry. The government has found after many years of war upon private trade that private capital in Russia does not exceed 5,000,000 rubles. The trade turnover hardly reaches 2,000,000,000 rubles a year.

Moscow, which is considered the biggest trade center in the Soviet Federation, made a trade turnover last year of 1,723,000,000 rubles. The bulk of this sum falls upon state and cooperative trade. 93 per cent of the Moscow industries are in the hands of the state and only seven percent is in the hands of cooperative and private concerns. Private manufacturers in Moscow employ only about 10,000 workmen, which is only 1.3 percent of the total number of workers engaged in Moscow industry.

SANTA BARBARA, Calif., July 17. (AP)—N. M. Willets, of Medford, Ore., who was badly injured by the explosion of a cleaning fluid in Santa Maria yesterday, is reported to be recovering. While badly burned, Willets is reported to have passed a good night and the doctors predict early recovery.
