**Beauty Specialists
Must Have Licenses**

It will be a violation of the law to engage in hair dressing, facial massage or skin treatment after July 31, 1925, without a state license. The office of the State Board of Health is receiving applications and it is absolutely necessary that all operators file an early date. Anyone who has been actively engaged in cosmetic therapy six months prior to July 31, 1925, will be entitled to a license by exemption. Those applying at once can receive a license without an examination. All those applying after July 31, 1925, will be required to take an examination. Applications should be made directly to the Secretary of the State Board of Cosmetic Therapy, 301 Fitzpatrick building, Portland, Oregon.

It is estimated that there are over one thousand cosmeticians operating in this state. To properly take care of the licensing thereof means a great deal of work and it will therefore be well to get applications in at as early a date as possible. No cosmetician will be allowed to operate after July 31, 1925, without a license.

**Narrow Escape On
Garfield Mountain**

Just two feet separated Miss Marian Miller from death yesterday afternoon, as she lay on a crag suffering from a broken angle and bruised leg.
