Many Tourists to Diamond Lake Take Trip to Crater Rim

(The Herald) DIAMOND LAKE, Ore., July 18.—With the opening of the Crater Rim road scheduled for the first of August it is expected that a large increase in the attendance of tourists at Diamond Lake will take place. With only 14 miles separating the two lakes when the Rim Road is open, a side trip to Diamond Lake from Crater is a pleasant day's journey. A noticeable change in the personnel of the visitors at the Lake is taking place, local patronage being substituted by tourists from other states, particularly California.

Last week several million, or perhaps billion, gnats invaded the lake. They came in phalanxes of tens of thousands and made life interesting, to say the least, for the campers, who were not protected by screens, ate gnats raw, fried, boiled and broiled. Today the gnats for the most part disappeared as swiftly and mysteriously as they came. A strong wind brought them across the lake several days ago, and it was believed that with the subsidence of the wind the gnats have returned to their former haunts where they will bother no one.

Elliott Tells What Policies to Be Followed

New Prosecutor Says There Will Be no Favorites

"There shall be no favorites. There shall be no axes to grind. The law will be enforced according to the statute book."

"I shall proceed slowly rather than be sorry afterward. Everybody shall be accorded fair and honest treatment."

In brief, these are the statements of E. L. Elliott, made in his office just a few hours after he had sent a telegram to Governor Pierce accepting the position of district attorney of Klamath county.

"I was talking," Mr. Elliott said, "to a friend a few minutes ago who said, 'Well, Mr. Elliott, I assume you will spend all your time in the suppression of the liquor traffic in Klamath.'"

"I told him," Mr. Elliott said, "that I would spend time in that work, but not all my time. For each law on the statute books should be enforced and I shall spend time on each one just in proportion to the manner in which they are obeyed."

Mr. Elliott gave the inside track on his appointment.

"When the National Guard encampment was under way in Medford, a committee of citizens journeyed over to call on the governor, who was attending the celebration. Their idea was to secure me as a special liquor prosecutor during the summer months, particularly around the Fourth of July."

"When I saw the governor there," he said, "Mr. Elliott, there is going to be a change in the district attorney's office soon, and I would like to know if you will take it."

"I didn't answer him, but turned around and talked to some other men in the room. Later in the day, I met the governor and he again said, 'Would you accept the position of district attorney if proffered?'"

"To which I answered that I was not looking for the job. But that isn't the question, Elliott," the governor said. "The question is will you accept?"

"So that is the inside of my appointment to the office of district attorney. I was not seeking the job and agreed to accept the position only after earnest solicitation on the part of the governor."

Mr. Elliott steadfastly refused to give an inkling as to who will be appointed deputy district attorney.

"I wish that the appointment was over with now," he said, "but it is better to be safe than sorry. So I shall proceed slowly."

Klamath Idea Goes Over Big in California

Stop Forest Fire Week Big Hit In Southern State

An idea which found its birth in Klamath Falls has proved so practical that it is being used in California with wonderful success, according to Rex R. Black, secretary of the California White Pine association, who visited Klamath Falls yesterday and this morning.

The Klamath idea, is the Stop Forest Fire association, which, at first sponsored by the Klamath County chamber of commerce and later by the state chamber, lined up the state as a unit in an attempt to prevent serious forest fires.

Indeed, so successful was the movement, Mr. Black pointed out, that California lumbermen were in the favor of the work and this summer 100 chambers of commerce were interested in the campaign to sign up one million members.

"I left before the campaign was over, but the idea was selling like wild fire at that time," Mr. Black said. "It is really a unique and effective way to educate the public on the prevention of forest fires. Mr. Black formerly worked in Klamath Falls, in connection with the government pine beetle control project. About a year and a half ago he resigned and several weeks later accepted a position as secretary of the White Pine Association. Larger mills of Klamath are members of the White Pine association."

CHICAGO, July 18.—Fowler McCormick, scion of the harvester manufacturing family, has deserted the overalls for the white-collar and business suit.
