Copco Employee Badly Injured

W. R. Anderson Is Knocked Unconscious

What might easily have proven a fatal injury to W. R. Anderson of the Copco, happened yesterday afternoon while he was working about ten miles out of the city on Spring creek. Anderson was strapped to a pole, working on what was supposed to be a dead line wire, when by some unknown cause the wire suddenly surged, burning both hands and rendering him unconscious. He was taken from the pole by fellow workers and rushed to the city at a record speed, where his severe burns were treated. The right hand and index finger are badly burned, the palm burn being very deep. The two small fingers on the left hand were burned, but not as deep as the right hand wounds.

Anderson was able to be about the streets today, and while he is a man of wonderful constitution, is suffering from the shock. At first

it was feared he might lose the index finger of the right hand, but today the attending physician feels confident it can be saved.

Farrera Resigns Labor Position

Nick Farrera, veteran secretary-treasurer of the old Timber Workers' union, last night submitted his resignation which was accepted by Secretary Duffy of the Central Labor Union. Although it did not belong to the international, the timber workers' union was functioning under a direct charter from the American Federation of Labor.

Plans are now on foot by Secretary Duffy and Business Representative Long to reorganize the timber workers in this district. Women workers in the lumber industry will be admitted to membership under present plans.

Hindenburg Signs Re-Valuation Bill

BERLIN, July 18.—(P)—President Von Hindenburg has signed

the re-valuation bill passed by the reichstag Tuesday providing for the exchange of German wartime and pre-war loans for a new issue equal to 5 per cent of the original loan. Obligations totaling 70,000,000,000 marks thus are converted into a gold debt of 3,500,000,000 marks.

Fall Sown Wheat Is Now Being Cut

EUGENE, Ore., July 18.—Fall sown wheat is being cut in Lane county, the harvesting operations starting this week. The harvest is expected to carry over into next week, and possibly a little longer.

Excessive heat of the past few days has not damaged the wheat to any great extent, as no winds accompanied the hot spell. A slight shriveling has been noticed in some parts, however.

Spring sown wheat is looking well.
