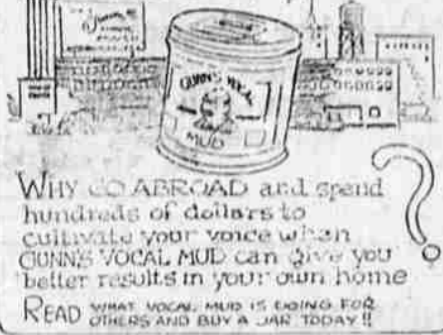

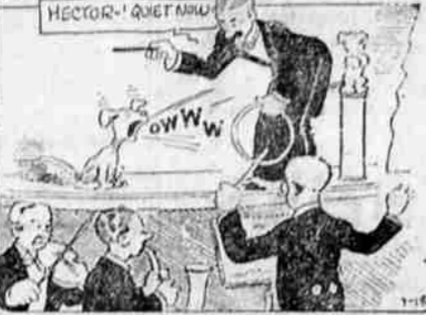

Moses Predicts Substantial Cut In Federal Tax

WASHINGTON, July 18.—(AP)—A substantial reduction in taxes by the next congress was predicted today by Senator Moses of New Hampshire, president pro tem of the senate, who also expressed a hope that the reduction could be made retroactive to become effective when returns are made out next March.

Turning to politics, Senator Moses said the people in New England took it for granted that President Coolidge would be renominated and reelected.

"They regard this as certain as anything can be that is in the future," he said.

Hawaiian Deaths Revive Poison Fish Traditions

HONOLULU.—(AP)—The death recently of two Chinese, which was attributed to the eating of the fresh puffer or balloon fish, has caused a dispute as to whether the fish, a fairly common variety in Hawaiian waters, is poisonous in itself or became so through poisonous seaweed eaten by the fish, or through improper methods of preparation.

The Queen's hospital, in a bulletin issued after exhaustive examination, declares that the six balloon fish which were supposed to have caused the death of the two Chinese were not poisonous. The bulletin explains further that it is possible that these fish at certain times or places eat a poisonous seaweed. The hospital points out also that there is a variety of the fish, comparatively rare, which is poisonous, with a secretion similar to the poison of certain toadstools, and that on the island of Molokai it is a well known fact that certain fish, such as the ordinary harmless ulua, if taken on one side of the island, are poisonous, but if caught elsewhere are wholesome food.

The mullet is said to be poisonous in Molokai waters at certain times of the year, and to produce choking, dizziness and terrifying dreams.

The legend is that certain gods came at various seasons to live at the seashore, and while they remained on the shore of a certain bay the fish were poisonous to man.

"The true explanation," say the hospital chemists, "is probably that at certain times and places the fish eat poisonous food."

Hawaiians, however, assert that there is no poisonous seaweed in Hawaiian waters.

Canadian Cowboy Declared Champ

EDMONTON, Alberta, July 15.—(AP)—Pete Knight, Crossfield, Alta., was declared world champion broncho buster as the result of winning first place in several hazardous rides on bad horses in the stampede which closed yesterday.

He was awarded a \$1000 prize, a handsome saddle and a championship belt. He defeated J. Coates, crack rider from Idaho.

Scopes Case To Continue Monday

DAYTON, Tenn., July 18. (AP)—While Judge Raulston and attorneys for the prosecution rested today after the arduous duties of the week, counsel for the defense of John Thomas Scopes, charged with violating the Tennessee anti-evolution statute, busied themselves with the preparation of scientific affidavits.

These will be brought into court Monday for the purpose of entering them into the record. Primarily they will show in detail the theory of evolution in an endeavor to connect the story of creation as recorded in the Bible.

Railroader Dies On Board Train

ROSEBURG, Ore., July 18.—R. E. Farmer, aged 55 years, trainmaster on the Wichita Falls and Southern Railroad, died this morning on northbound Southern Pacific passenger train number 14, shortly before its arrival in this city. His body was taken off the train here, and will be returned to Wichita Falls, Texas. Mr. and Mrs. Farmer were on a pleasure trip along the coast, and he had just gone to the washroom when death occurred, evidently from heart failure. The body was found a few minutes later, Mrs. Max Hall, and Mrs. Helen Cleaver, both of Chicago, Ill., passengers on the train with Mr. and Mrs. Farmer, stopped off in this city with the widow, who is suffering greatly from the shock of her husband's sudden death.
