

### Slashing Fire Threatens Bray Stand Of Timber

A stand of virgin yellow pine was threatened yesterday, when seven acres of old slashing on the Bear Valley road, four miles south of Worden, was in flames and creeping gradually nearer the timber line. A force of fire fighters from the Klamath Forest Protective association was rushed to the scene of the blaze and after a fight that lasted all day and into the night, corralled the fire.

Two men were stationed at the fire today to prevent a further outbreak. The timber threatened by the slash blaze is owned by William Bray of the Oshkosh Timber company.

No clues of the origin of the fire were uncovered by rangers. It was thought that a carelessly thrown cigarette from an automobile driving either to or from Bear Valley, ignited a bit of brush.

### Japanese Art Work Will Be Sold Shortly

TOKYO (AP)—The collection of art treasures in the possession of Marquis Katsunosuke Inouye, former ambassador to the court of St. James, is to be sold at public auction in September. The collection was made by the late Marquis Segal Inouye and is known among connoisseurs as one of the finest in the country. Its estimated value is between 4,000,000 and 5,000,000 yen. Among the many rare articles in the collection is a carving by the celebrated Choin representing "Fudo," the god of fire. It was to this image, according to the tradition attached to it, that Emperor Kameyama offered prayers for victory when the land of the Mikado was invaded by the Chinese some 600 years ago. This carving alone is valued at 150,000 yen.

Another rare work of art is a painting by Haku Shi-kei. It is the most valuable work of a Chinese artist in the collection. It is an unusually large picture showing the figure of Buddha mounted on an elephant. There are many other fine paintings by Japanese masters such as Montonobu, Seshu and Tannyu. The collection comprises 2600 pieces, including paintings, carvings, pottery and lacquer work.

### France Plans Big Offensive

PARIS, July 20 (AP)—France will start a great military offensive in Morocco against Abd-El-Krim, Premier Painleve said today, if the Riffian leaders refuse peace terms offered him by semi-official Franco-Spanish agents.

The premier told today's cabinet meeting that Abd-El-Krim knows the terms upon which he can have peace with France and Spain in Morocco and that the Riffian leader can open negotiations immediately if he desires.

The French front is so strengthened, the premier said, that there is no longer justification for any uneasiness.

#### FARM POINTERS

### Three Forest Fires Burning in Washington

SEATTLE, July 20, (AP)—Three serious forest fires entailing heavy losses were burning today in different sections of western Washington. One blaze has destroyed green timber at Lyman, 100 miles north of Seattle, in the Skagit Mill company's holdings, another was burning in standing timber in the Olympic national forest west of Quilcene in eastern Jefferson county, and the third was blazing in the edge of green timber in the Doty Lumber company's holdings in Lewis county after destroying one of the company's camps and considerable fall-off timber. More than 100 men are fighting at Lyman in an effort to check the blaze from sweeping through green timber. It was reported that the

flames had burned a mile into the timber.

The fire in the Doty Lumber company holdings started Friday night and a high northerly wind caused it to spread rapidly. It burned over a large section of logged off land and nearly 600,000 feet of cedar logs were destroyed.

A big crew of men are fighting the fire in an effort to check its course. Until Saturday, the flames were confined to logged-off land on the edge of the company's holdings, but a change in the wind swept it across the boundary into the Olympic national forest reserve.
