Malin Wallops Alturas Nine in Good Game

California Team Meets First Defeat of Season

A screeching two-bagger to deep center from the bat of Jelinek, plus the invincible pitching of Street, was the death song of Alturas, which met its first defeat of the season yesterday afternoon at the hands of Malin, 4 to 2.

Street for Malin was the master of proceedings from the start and had he received any support at all the score would have been 4 to 0. But it seemed that every time an Alturas batter would hit the ball into the infield fairly he would be assured a base.

In the first of the second, errors by the Malin infield placed men on second and third with one out. Street crashed through in wonderful shape and struck out the next two batters. The same story was true of the first half of the third, when the lanky Malin school teacher, bowled over two Alturas sluggers with men on second and third.

In the last half of the third, Crowder of Alturas blew up and was replaced by Byles after one run had been scored by Malin and the bases were loaded with one out.

Then it was that Jelinek's bat came into play. With two strikes on him, the husky young farmer leaped into a groover and sent it far out into center field for a two bagger. Three men scored but Jelinek was nipped as he tried to stretch the double into a triple.

With the score 4 to 0 against them, Alturas came back desper-

ately the first half of the fourth and managed, through Malin errors, to push over one score.

The day looked cloudy for Malin just once, the first half of the eighth. California sluggers were beginning to find Street's benders. One man had scored when an incident occurred that nearly broke up the game. Auble had doubled, scoring a man before him, and as the Malin outfielders played pussy in the corner with the pill, he tried to stretch it into a triple. Malin's centerfielder leaved wildly to third base, the third baseman missed and Auble sprinted for home. The wild ball struck the third base coach and gave the third baseman time to heave the ball home to nick Auble sliding. Alturas claimed the ball was dead. Malin took the opposite stand, Malin won.

The game was witnessed by several hundred spectators including a cheering section from Alturas.

EUGENE, Ore., July 18.—The "National Missions" board of the Presbyterian church organization, which is composed of several score missionary projects, has completed a very successful year, according to the report of the body presented at the Presbyterian synod of Oregon National Mission session here. It will be necessary, however, to raise an additional \$1,000,000 for this work next year, to cover a deficit of \$451,997 of the past year and a similar estimated amount for the coming year, it was reported.

A national missions week in November has been set aside as a period for raising funds for the work, and other days have also been designated.

Cattle Will Be Tested For T. B. On August First

Word was received at the county agent's office today that Dr. Bishop, from the U. S. bureau of animal industry, will begin work in Klamath county August 1st.

There will be no charge to stock owners for tuberculosis testing, but it is necessary to arrange a route of operation for Dr. Bishop and time is too limited to permit of retraversing any one section unnecessarily. Stockmen are asked to list their names and number of head to be tested at the county agent's office or phone such information to 214, during business hours. Test is made only on application for such service.

Under the state law it is necessary that all stock be tubercular tested within six months of showing at county or state fairs. For this reason alone owners of animals priming them for showing at the county fair in September must have their certificate of health to enter animals.

Names of those desiring this service must be received at the county agent's office not later than 5 p. m. July 31st.

EARTHQUAKE IS FELT NEAR BAY

Sharp Tremors Noted But no Damage Done Around San Francisco

SAN FRANCISCO, July 20. (AP)—The sharp earthquake which was felt yesterday morning in the San Francisco Bay district and south along the peninsula for a distance of 50 miles subsided without causing any damage, although momentary alarm was occasioned.

The seismograph at the Observatory at the University of Santa Clara, recorded the shock as commencing at 11:24 a. m. and terminating gradually five minutes later. For twenty seconds, however, the pens on the seismograph vibrated to their full amplitude of 10 centimeters. The quake was described as an epifocal or local disturbance.

Church congregations at San Jose, approximately 50 miles south of here, hurriedly made their way to the streets, but the excitement soon subsided.

The center of the disturbance appeared to be at a point in the Pacific ocean about two hundred miles northwest of here.

These five will comprise a board of directors which will meet at stated intervals to attend to the policies of the paper. Plans were laid to create a contact with every agricultural community in the county by establishing correspondents. Purpose of the publication was said to be the best interests of the farmers.

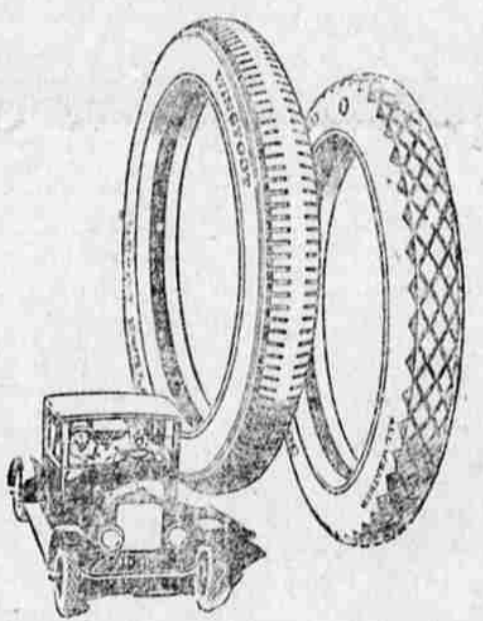
