Leipsic Fair This Fall to Surpass Many

LEIPSIC.—The coming Leipsic fair to be held from August 30 to September 9, promises to surpass any previous Leipsic exhibition. It is expected the attendance will be nearly double that of the spring fair, at which there were more than 180,000 business men from all parts of the world, with 14,000 exhibitors from 18 countries.

One of the features of the coming fair will be the huge underground exhibition hall, generally considered a technical world's wonder. Another prominent feature will be the largest exhibition hall in Germany. It occupies an area of 21,000 square meters. The old house for electro-technics has been materially enlarged to two wings each two stories high. In order to furnish the necessary space for the erection of a number of new exhibition buildings, the municipality of Leipsic has placed a further area of 130,000 square meters at the disposal of the administrators of the fair. This permits sufficient space for the construction of a special freight station.

There is also a plan on foot to have foreign firms display their exhibits in special halls in a "Street of Nations."

The magnitude of the Leipsic Fair has made a division into two sections necessary. "The General Sample Exhibit," and "The Technical and Constructive Exhibit." The latter exhibition will continue four days longer than the former and will be arranged in 15 halls. The "Sample Exhibit" will be contained in 80 halls and special buildings.

STERLING'S RISE AFFECTS DIAMOND SALES TO AMERICANS IN LONDON

LONDON. — (AP) — Diamonds as large as hazelnuts in settings for men have attracted much attention here lately where jewelry of this Dealers here say the Americans Englishmen, excepting in rare instances, never wear diamonds, especially as rings, and on this account they never are seen in the jewelry shops until spring when the tourist season opens. Dealers here say the Americans are buying fewer diamonds than formerly. This is attributed to the fact that the stones are approximately as dear here as in the United States now that the pound sterling is virtually at par, and in addition purchasers are expected to pay the 60 percent duty when arriving on the other side.

BASEBALL PROVES BEST MONEY MAKING SPORT IN THE PHILIPPINES

MANILA. (AP) — That baseball is the most popular sport in the Philippine Islands was indicated when the total receipts at the Far Eastern Olympic games became known recently. The receipts at the six baseball games played among the Philippines, Japan and China amounted to \$9,980, while football drew the next largest attendance, the total receipts for that sport being \$3,961. The total receipts for all the events amounted to \$26,180. It was explained that the receipts from the track and field events, which amounted to only \$3,780, probably would have been much larger, had not Japan's athletes walked off the field as a protest against the disqualification of one of her runners for fouling on the second day of the meet.

JAPANESE SYNDICATE IS FORMED TO EXPLOIT COAL AND OIL FIELDS

TOKYO. (AP) — The government authorities are reported to have reached an agreement on the proposed formation of a semi-official syndicate for the exploitation of the Saghalien coal and oil fields. The Oil syndicate will have a capital of 10,000,000 yen and the coal syndicate will be capitalized for 10,000,000 yen. Half of the capital is to be invested by the Hokuhaikai, the old syndicate interested in Saghalien, and the North Saghalien Industrial company, and the remainder will be offered for general subscription. The imperial navy will purchase the entire oil output. Only Japanese subjects will be allowed to subscribe for shares.

PARIS, July 17. (AP) — Total French casualties so far in the Moroccan war with Abd-el-Krim's Rifians are given by the Petit Journal in a Feb dispatch as 4,143. Of these 797 were killed, 2775 wounded and 566 missing.

MEADOW PARK IN CHICAGO LARGE
CHICAGO. (AP) — The largest clear level grass meadow in any park in the United States is the one in Washington Park here. It has an area of 101.7 square acres, which is nearly one-third of the total area of the park.

The meadow is as level as an engineering skill can make it and is covered with a velvet coat of grass. There is space for 280 perfect football grounds, 125 baseball fields and more than 1,800 tennis courts.

Here Chicago's multitudes find room to "stretch their legs." The meadow is surrounded by shaded walks and pleasure drives, miniature lakes and flower gardens. The famous "Bug Club," an institution unique to Chicago, meets at this spot. Men, women and children of every description gather in groups to listen to soap box orators and demagogues deliver impassioned messages. It is a place where the American right to absolute freedom of speech is unhampered.

Washington Park is the second largest of Chicago's parks, ranking next to Jackson, which has an area of 554 acres. More than \$2,700,000 has been spent in improvements, plus the original cost of the land. The park has 110 tennis courts, 29 baseball diamonds and two football fields, in addition to 45,000 square feet of children's play ground, 25,000 square feet of wading pools and 1,550 square feet of sand courts.
