Rancher Buried In 52-Foot Well

Dennis Murphy Believed Dead Following Fall Yesterday Noon

OLYMPIA, Wash., July 21.—All hope that Dennis Murphy, aged Rochester Prairie rancher, who was imprisoned at the bottom of a 52-foot well yesterday, would be reached before nightfall today was abandoned, it was reported from Rochester this morning. Although the rescue force numbers 29 men, conditions under which they are obliged to work impede progress to such an extent that he will probably not be reached until Wednesday morning, it was said.

Murphy was imprisoned shortly after noon yesterday when the curbing of the well gave way after he had descended into the well to clean it out, burying him under several tons of earth. Rescue work was started as soon as new curbing material could be secured and the work was rushed throughout the night. All hope that he will be found alive has been given up, it was said.

MEDFORD TO GET AIR MAIL ROUTE

MEDFORD, Ore., July 21.—The Medford post office advertised for bids today for an airplane mail service scheduled to be established from this city to Los Angeles and Seattle on October 1. The bids call for a speed of 90 miles an hour and a schedule from Medford to Portland of two hours and 45 minutes. Medford is the only air mail station in the state scheduled outside of Portland, according to the postmaster general's announcement.

100 Americans at Royal Party

LONDON, July 21. (AP)—About 100 Americans were among the 6,000 guests who today attended a garden party given by King George and Queen Mary at Buckingham place. The visitors were especially interested in seeing the portable outdoor canvas where the King works during hot weather.

High School Boy Dies Of Injuries

MEDFORD, Ore., July 21.—Henry Sanders, Medford high school student, 16 years old, step-son of D. Wolf of this city, died at a local hospital last night as the result of injuries received Saturday night when he was knocked down by a car on Beall Lane driven by F. B. Goodhue of Central Point, Mr. Goodhue, who is heartbroken over the tragedy, surrendered to the authorities and explained that the accident was due to the fact that he had to dim his lights for a passing car and the boy was on the wrong side of the road. A coroner's inquest will probably be held.

DEPUTY SHERIFF SHOT IN BITTER MOUNTAIN FEUD

Sam Godsey, Picturesque Officer in Tennessee, Wounded in Legs

USES HUMAN SHIELD Man Who Was Kidnaped and Chain to Tree Oppens Fire on his Traducer

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn., July 21. (AP)—Sam Godsey, Sequeatchie county deputy sheriff used Attorney General George W. Chamblee as a shield while under fire of Lawrence Bowman, in reviving a feud last night in which Godsey and his brother Benton Godsey were shot in the legs.

Sam Godsey at the hospital this morning stated that Bowman had started the battle while Godsey was upbraiding Attorney General Chamblee for not indicting Bowman for carrying a pistol in another case. A bullet went through Chamblee's gut.

Renches for Gun

Bowman said Sam Godsey was cursing him to Chamblee and when he got a glance at Bowman he went for his gun.

Renewal of Feud

The battle was a renewal of the mountain feud of long standing in which several persons have been shot. Bowman was kidnaped a few weeks ago along with Dr. W. S. Masten and tied to trees on Signal mountain for ten days. He is said to hold the Godseys responsible for the crime.

On the other hand the Godseys claim that Bowman was aroused over the idea that they had recently discovered his still.
