MONOPOLY OF SUGAR AND TEA PROPOSED BY PERSIA

BAGDAD.—Decision of the Persian government to put through a bill to empower it to take over the import and sale of tea and sugar in Persia as a state monopoly has aroused considerable feeling in commercial circles here.

The seriousness of the matter from the local point of view may be gauged from the fact that, except for cotton piece goods, a very large proportion of the considerable re-export trade from this country to Persia consists of tea and sugar. The buying arrangements in Europe and the large bulk of this now remaining in the hands of Bagdad middlemen, Persian merchants not as a rule buying further afield than this city. Presumably, the Persian government intends to make its own arrangements in Europe, and to cut out the Bagdad middleman altogether.

Prussian Decree Directs Licenses To Music Teachers

BERLIN, (AP)—All music teachers in Prussia are henceforth to be licensed, according to the latest decree issued by the government.

"A degree of order and uniformity of qualification in a world hitherto beset by many charlatans and opportunists may be expected from such a decree," says the Vorwaerts, which describes how private musical instruction had become a very negligible quantity during the war and subsequently in the inflation period and that on the whole the government unfortunately had never considered music as significant educational purposes.

The decree mentions that "a decisive change may now be expected in musical education." All private music teachers under a certain age, providing they have not gained from some accredited musical institution, will be obliged to pass an examination. They will then be taught with an official license to teach music. Without such a license no teacher is to be allowed to give instructions.

GERMAN FLEET MAKES HEADWAY

HAMBURG, (AP)—The growth of Germany's merchant fleet since the World war is reflected in the usually reliable Danish statistics on the proportionate merchant tonnage of various maritime countries to their population.

In the list Germany is near the bottom with 30 British register tons for each 100 inhabitants, but gets some consolation out of its low standing for the fact that what there is of German shipping is of first-class order. Having lost so much of its shipping as a result of war settlements, Germany was obliged to make up these losses with new vessels, so that nearly 53 per cent of the present merchant marine consists of ships less than five years old. The low percentage of the country's merchant fleet was conspicuously shown in 1924 in the port of Hamburg, when the German flag was represented by only 37 per cent of the entire traffic of the harbor.

The Danish statistics on proportionate tonnage places Norway first with 822 tons to each 1000 inhabitants; England second with 492 tons and Denmark third with 239 tons.

England Plans Long Range Radio

LONDON, (AP)—In addition to the big radio station now being built at Rugby, the postmaster-general is planning to erect another high-power station at Wintroppe, near Skegness, on the east coast. This station, when completed, is expected to be used for communication with Australia and India.

HITCHIN, Eng.—Forty thousand homing pigeons were released here recently for participation in the greatest flight of its kind ever organized in England. The birds flew to their homes in various parts of the north and northeast coast in competitions arranged by 15 federations of fanciers. Forty-two special railway vans, holding approximately 1,600 birds, were required to transport the pigeons to Hitchin for participation in the race.
