Speeders Happy While Judge Is Away At Springs

As long as Justice of the Peace R. E. Hunsaker remains at Turner Springs in his effort to effect a permanent cure of a malicious rheumatic affection of the arm, speeders have some hope of getting away with only a severe reprimand.

W. A. Foster, state traffic officer, explained the situation today.

“When I arrest a man going out of the county, for example on the Green Springs road, and he has no cash bail to put up, then I am forced to bring him back to Klamath Falls for appearance before a judge,” he said. “County Judge Bunnell is acting during Mr. Hunsaker's absence, but other business often keeps him away from Klamath Falls for several days at a time.”

“Therefore, the man is forced to wait around Klamath Falls until he can appear before a magistrate, and it is hardly fair. Take for example last Sunday when a delegation from Weed that attended the baseball game was speeding out of the county on the Green Springs road, in an effort to make the trip home that night, I stopped several of the

machines that were exceeding the speed limit but had to let them go with a warning, owing to lack of a judge.

“If there was only a magistrate at Keno, my troubles would be solved.”

Mrs. Lang To Be Tried July 27th

Mrs. Lulu Lang, Klamath Indian, will be tried on July 27 on a charge of destroying a public record at Klamath Agency. On the 28th she will stand trial on another charge of disturbing the peace at Klamath Agency, in connection with the first charge. Both cases will be tried in the United States District court in Portland.

Clarence Mose, a young Indian who is held in Portland on a charge of forging the name of Fred A. Baker, former superintendent of the Klamath Indian reservation to a check, will be tried in the federal court June 29.

Mills Addition School Will Get New Class Room

Rapid increase in enrollment at Mills Addition school on East Main street led to the letting of a contract by the city school board Monday night for the construction of an additional school room in the basement of the school. The contract was let to John Almeter, who is also building the new Central school, and will cost \$1500.

W. D. Miller Construction company was the sole bidder on the job which calls for the levelling and surfacing of the school grounds of Riverside school. The contract will not be let until the school board comes to a decision on what type of surfacing shall be used.

School Contract Awarded By Board

Contract for the construction of a new school at Sprague River was awarded yesterday to Ed. Holtomley and W. J. Kiefer, local contractors, the county school superintendent's office announced this morning. Cost of the new building will be \$4920 and the structure must be completed by September 15, when

school opens. The school will be a frame structure with two school rooms and with two rooms in which the teachers will make their homes. Contracts for the construction of one room additions onto the school at Lamm's mill and Chiloquin have not been awarded.

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
