

Sentiment Is Against Including Diamond Lake in National Park

DIAMOND LAKE, Ore., July 22. —(Special to The Herald)—Diamond Lake will never become a part of Crater Lake National park if the wishes of the people in Douglas county are carried out. This was the sentiment expressed by the delegation of Douglas county men who visited Diamond lake yesterday in the interests of completing the Umpqua road between Roseburg and Diamond lake.

"This theory of including all the playgrounds in the national parks is not right," declared A. C. Marsters of the Roseburg chamber of commerce, who headed the delegation. "Inclusion of Diamond lake into Crater Lake national park would mean the cutting of the privileges of the people. People do not want restriction on their freedom, they want to come and go and do as they please."

Mr. Marsters stated that practically all the Roseburg people were strongly opposed to changing the present status of Diamond lake. The chamber of commerce has already gone on record as opposing the inclusion into Crater.

A petition to Oregon representatives in congress against the inclusion project was signed by practically all the members of the delegation.

The Crater lake-Diamond lake question was recently brought into the limelight by the statement of Stephen T. Mather, head of the national park service, made recently in Medford, in which he stated that he hoped the Diamond lake country would be taken into Crater. This re-opened the fight which has laid dormant for several years, and discussion over the question is again quite general in this part of the country.

The arguments advanced in favor of taking in Diamond lake are mainly to the effect that such an action would make a better park out of Crater; that Crater lake in itself is not sufficient to hold tourists any length of time. As some one has put it, visitors come to Crater lake, drink in its beauty and then say, "Wonderful! That's fine. Now where do we go from here?" Diamond Lake, on the other hand, holds tourists for long periods, and it is for this reason that the Crater lake people would like to see their boundaries enlarged.

Advocates of a separation of the two lakes admit that such an action would make a better park out of Crater; they contend, however, that nothing is to be gained by the people who visit Diamond lake, and that much is to be lost.

In the first place, admittance into Diamond lake, which is under the supervision of the United States department of agriculture, and in the U. S. forest service, being in the Umpqua national forest, is free of charge. Were it in the National park a charge of \$2.50 would be made. Hunting would be curtailed, as guns in national parks must be sealed. No one could put a private boat on the lake. Camping would be restricted and no one could have summer homes on the lake, as at present. If some one had a pet dog, or cat, he could bring the animal along, as the lake now stands. Inclusion in the national park would mean that the cat would have to be left at home, and the dog muzzled all the time.

Another argument advanced is the one in favor of cattle grazing. At present thousands of dollars are brought into the state and county from the grazing, which also keeps down the fire hazard. Were Diamond lake in Crater lake park this would be stopped by the park regulation.

Furthermore, the anti-inclusionists ask, why change the administration when every one, except the park people, are quite contented with matters as they now stand? Why give up the freedom of the woods for a district as full of regulations as a city park?

A forest ranger who cares for campers and tourists has been stationed at Diamond Lake for several years.
