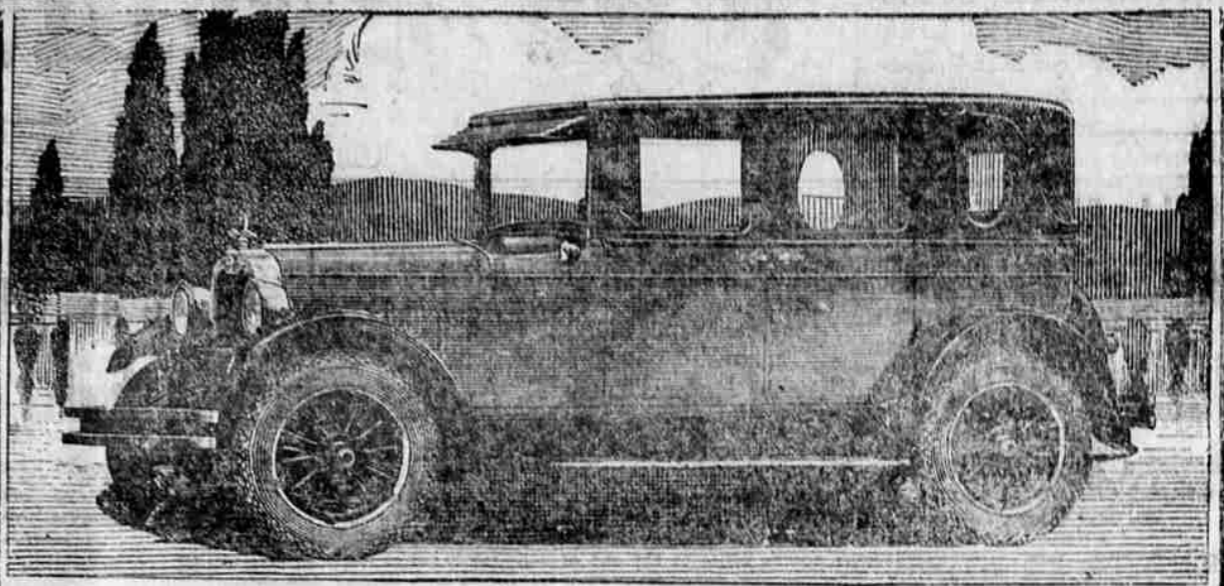
actor's home. Summoned to court, he packed his pet in a suitcase.

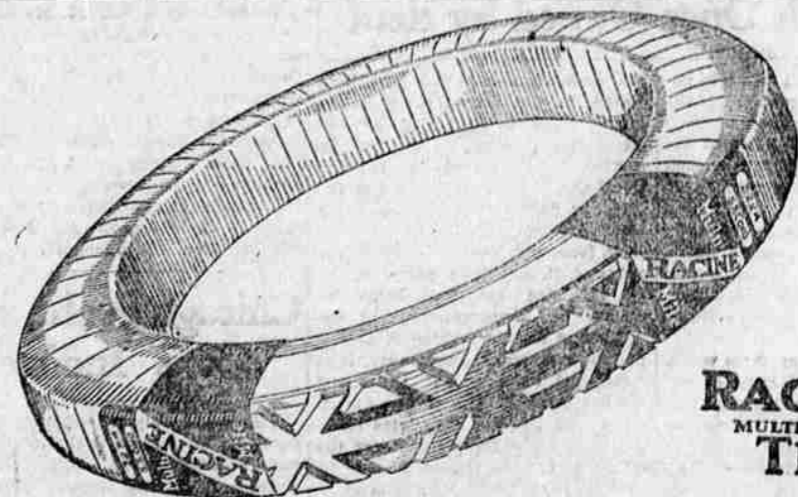
