

Noted Angler Says Diamond Lake Is Finest Fishing That He Has Ever Enjoyed on the Pacific Coast

DIAMOND LAKES, July 28.—“Trout fishing in Diamond Lake is the best I have ever seen,” declared Dr. B. F. Alden of San Francisco, who has left for the Yellowstone park on an extended vacation tour. “Considering the size of the fish, and the numbers and the ease of catching, fishing at Diamond Lake surpasses anything I have ever experienced.”

Dr. Alden, who has been registered at the lodge for the past week with his wife and daughter and son-in-law, Dr. and Mrs. R. E. Scovel, is one of San Francisco's most prominent surgeons and is an expert fisherman. For many years he has fished in practically all the streams and lakes in California and Oregon, although the visit to Diamond Lake this year was his first.

Dr. Alden is a member of the famous Tuna club of Avalon, in the Catalina islands, off the coast of California. To be eligible in this club a person must catch a tuna weighing 100 pounds or a sword fish weighing 200 pounds with regulation tackle, consisting of 900 feet of 24 strand Cuttyhunk line, and a 16-ounce rod, 9 feet over all. After this catch has been made, the fisherman is eligible for membership. At the present time 100 active members are on the club roster, with several hundred asso-

ciate members from all parts of the world.

From 1910 until 1922 Dr. Alden held the world's record for the largest yellow fin tuna which weighed 151 pounds, caught on regulation tackle. In 1922 this was beaten by a 195 pound specimen.

The world's record for blue fin tuna was held from 1901 until 1924 by Col. H. E. Moorehouse of Pasadena, who brought in a specimen weighing 251 pounds. In 1924 this record was beaten by Harry Mallon, who caught a blue fin tuna weighing 296 pounds. This is now the world's record. This same Harry Mallon in 1924 caught a broad bill sword fish weighing 561 pounds with regulation tackle.

Fishing for tuna and sword fish is described by Dr. Alden as being great sport. Frequently several hours are required to wear down the fish, and often times powerful men come in with wrists swollen far beyond their natural size from the terrific strain. Runs of several hundred yards are made by the fish and the game resolves itself into a resistance struggle between the man and the fish.

Mrs. Alden is also an expert fisherwoman. In 1915 she held the record for the largest white sea bass caught that year.

At Diamond Lake Dr. and Mrs. Alden and Dr. and Mrs. Scovel were all rewarded with ample catches, both in lake and creek trout.

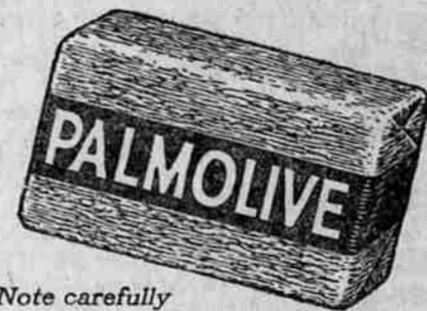

Bryan's Address Is Given Public

DAYTON, Tenn., July 28.—(AP)—"The Tennessee case" an address by William Jennings Bryan in defense of the Tennessee anti-evolution law which the late commoner was prevented from delivering at the Dayton trial because of an early termination of the case, was made known to the world today by Mrs. Bryan.

"A sudden decision of the defense to submit the case without argument and permit a verdict of guilty, prevented the delivery of the speech," says an introductory note to Mr. Bryan's address.

"As it presents the issues involved and the requirements of the law prohibiting the teaching in public schools of any hypothesis that makes man a descendant of any lower form of life, it is printed for the information of the general public."

Mr. Bryan declared in the address that the case was no longer local, but that it "had assumed the proportions of a battle-royal between unbelief that attempts to speak through so-called science and the defenders of the Christian faith speaking through the legislature of Tennessee."

"It is for the jury to determine whether this attack upon the Christian religion shall be permitted in the public schools of Tennessee by teachers employed by the state and paid out of the public treasury," was a conclusion drawn.

Many Klamath People Visit National Park

Records Disclose This City Leads All Others

Klamath Falls had its usual exodus to Crater Lake National Park on Sunday. Seventy-four cars carrying three hundred and eleven persons took advantage of the combined opportunity of an unusually lovely day and the close proximity of one of nature's wonderlands to spend all or part of the day off in the park. A total of 172 cars and 646 persons visited the lake by way of the South Entrance, of which 121 cars and 478 persons were from Oregon alone.

Other states registering cars at this entrance were California 38 cars, 122 persons; Washington 5 cars, 14 persons; Illinois 3 cars, 10 persons; Nebraska one car, 7 persons; Idaho one car, one person; Kentucky one car, one person; Colorado one car, 2 persons; Texas one car, 5 persons. Of the five persons on the stage, one was from Klamath Falls, two were from Minnesota and one each from Washington and California.

The Klamath Falls cars always form the bulk of the traffic into the

park during the early hours on Sunday. One car honked the ranger out of bed before 5 o'clock to be registered, although he was not supposed to go on duty till 6 o'clock.

During the week California leads all the other states in the number of cars registering at this entrance, but on Sunday Oregon more than makes up the difference. The following is a list of the cars by states to date at this entrance:

The following states registered one car each: Oklahoma, Arkansas, Georgia, Florida, North Dakota, Indiana, New Jersey, New Mexico, Wisconsin, Hawaii, Tennessee, and Kentucky. Maryland, Minnesota and New York each had visitors by stage.
