LET JUDGMENT BE WITHHELD

The indictment of E. L. Elliott today on a charge of malfeasance in office comes as a distinct blow to Klamath county and its people. Coming as it does almost on the eve of his induction into office as district attorney, it places the accused man under a serious handicap, and one which it will be hard for him to overcome for the time being, at least.

With the utmost sincerity, the Evening Herald urges that the spirit of fair play prevail; that people generally withhold their opinion as to Mr. Elliott's guilt or innocence until he has been accorded a fair and impartial trial by jury.

The deliberations of the grand jury are of necessity secret in their nature. All of the evidence which was given and all which might have transpired behind those locked doors may never become known. The indictment simply means that the grand jurors had reason to believe that a crime has been committed and that sufficient evidence was produced to convince them that Mr. Elliott should be held for trial.

It is indeed unfortunate that the newly appointed district attorney should bear this added burden when he takes office. In fairness to all, he should be accorded a speedy and impartial trial.

The Evening Herald is frank to say that it did not approve of his appointment to that office. But having been appointed, The Evening Herald stood ready to support him just so long as he proved himself an able, fearless and unbiased prosecutor.

Indian Medium Given Release

GREENFIELD, Mass., July 29.—(AP)—Chief Rheamont, Indian spiritualistic medium, arrested several weeks ago on a warrant charging assault on a fellow medium in the midst of a seance, was freed today in district court, when the complainant, Convers Nickerson, failed to appear.

The warrant, sworn out four years ago, charged that Rheamont struck Nickerson on the head with a guitar when the latter entered a room in which the Indian medium was conducting a seance at the Lake Pleasant spiritualistic colony near here. It was said that Nickerson had thrown a flashlight on Rheamont, spilling the seance. Nickerson is at present on the Pacific coast.

Two Autos Crash On Ashland Road

H. Brink and Carl Schluckeise of Oakland were severely injured this morning and A. Deverl faces arrest on a charge of reckless driving as the result of an automobile accident on the Ashland-Klamath Falls highway 30 miles east of Klamath Falls.

Brink and Schluckeise were driving westward on the road when they were struck by Deverl, traveling, according to State Officer W. A. Foster, at an excessive rate of speed. The car was turned over and the two men were slightly injured. Schluckeise is suffering from a fractured rib and Brink from cuts and bruises about the head.

Foster said this afternoon that he would recommend that Deverl's driving license be withdrawn.

Film Fans Hear Kidnaping Case

Plot to Hold Mary Pickford for Ransom Bared in Criminal Trial

LOS ANGELES, Calif., July 29.—(AP)—A large crowd of film fans were on hand early at the court house here today where three men on trial charged with conspiring to kidnap Mary Pickford and hold her for \$200,000 ransom. The scramble for seats started when the district attorney announced that the actress might be called to tell what she knows of the alleged attempt to kidnap her.

It was not entirely definite that she will be called but the district attorney said she was read. The bombshell thrown into the proceedings late yesterday was the defense called C. A. Holcomb, one of the defendants, to the stand to testify that he had been beaten into making a statement to detectives through the testimony out of order, the district attorney said.

The defense attorneys said they expected today to offer further proof that C. Z. Stephens and Adrain J. Wood, the other defendant, suffered at the hands of the officers when they refused to make a statement after their arrest. Several newspaper men are on the witness role to substantiate these charges, the attorneys said.

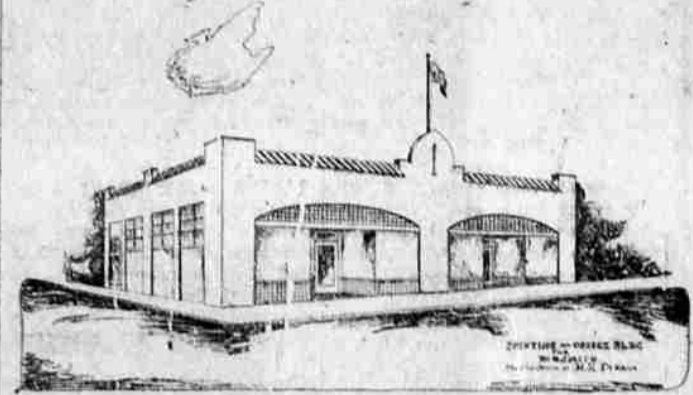

TWO NEW SPANS WILL BE BUILT ACROSS STREAM

One Will be at Harpole Dam; Another on State Line Road

BRIDGE TOTTERING

Structures to be Completed Before Snow Flies this Winter

A new bridge will be built across Lost River at the state line and the Harpole dam bridge just west of Bonanza will be rebuilt before the snow flies, County Judge R. H. Bunnell announced this morning.

Declared unsafe, the county court will close the Harpole Dam bridge across Lost River to traffic and in the near future will advertise for bids for the construction of a practically new bridge.

The feature of the new Harpole Dam span, will be that stone abutments will support the structure and that the bridge will be shortened from a 250-foot bridge to an 80-foot bridge. From the material that will be obtained from the old bridge, the new frame bridge will be built.

Provision will be made in the reconstruction, for a steel span, when the traffic that will be routed over the bridge warrants such a move, Judge Bunnell said.

17 Years Old

The Harpole Dam bridge is located on the Poe Valley market road, approximately 20 miles from Klamath Falls. It has been standing for 17 years and its supports will give way any day under a heavy load.

After several years of negotiations with county authorities of Siskiyou county, California, arrangements have finally been consummated for the construction of a bridge across Lost River at the point where the State Line road crosses the river.

Cost of the new bridge will be divided between the two counties, Klamath and Siskiyou, Judge Bunnell pointed out.

Three To Be Built

With the construction of the Malone bridge at Langell's Valley post office, three new spans will be built across Lost River this summer. The county road engineer, Frank Z. Howard, is now preparing plans and specifications for the bridges that will be submitted to the court before that body advertises for bids.

Fairview School Now On New Site

Fairview school, for many years serving one district, is now moved to a new location, adjacent to the Mt. Laki store, and will henceforth serve two districts. It was announced today by County School Superintendent Fred Peterson.

The moving of the two room structure has just been completed and today a force of painters and kalamanders are working on the structure to get it in good condition for the opening of school next fall.

The school will serve Mt. Laki and Fairview districts.

THREE SLAIN BY JEALOUS YOUTH

Rudolph Disse, 18, Kills Two Men and His Sweetheart in Restaurant

RICHMOND, Va., July 29.—His jealousy for Mrs. Vivian Tomlin Peers, former artists' model, caused Rudolph E. Disse, 18, to kill her and two men and seriously wound another man in a sudden burst of gun play yesterday, the youth confessed to police.

Detective Sergeant J. Harvey Burke, who died last night, as the third victim, was one of the two men whom Disse said he shot because he was afraid they would frustrate his purpose of killing G. Carter, the other victim, and his supposed rival, after he had shot Mrs. Peers.

Willis Britt, who was seriously wounded, was a stranger to the others and had simply volunteered to take Mrs. Peers, Disse and Burke in his automobile when they were leaving police court. Mrs. Peers had been arraigned on charges made by Disse and the latter was in court on charges by Carter that he had threatened him. Both cases were continued and as the two left court Burke arrested Disse on a bad check charge. He accompanied them with Britt when Mrs. Peers said she wanted to get some clothes at Disse's home.

Remaining in the car as the others stepped to the sidewalk Disse suddenly whipped out a pistol and without warning shot down the woman and the two men.

Rushing to a restaurant owned by Carter, Disse started a crowd by bursting through the door and brandishing the revolver.

Before Carter had warning, witnesses said, he was shot through the heart by Disse.

Hunsaker Too Ill To Take Up Work

Justice of the Peace R. E. Hunsaker will not resume his duties as justice of the peace, according to well founded reports about the court house.

The magistrate, who has been at Turner Springs for the past two weeks in an attempt to cure an infection of his arm, returned to Klamath Falls yesterday little better than when he started out to the springs.

He is unable to sit up and the strain which would come with the handling of the duties of the justice of the peace is held to be too severe.

Whether or not Hunsaker will resign his position at this time is not known, although his friends declare that when he is satisfied that his illness will keep him permanently from discharging the duties of his office that he will resign immediately.

Duties of justice court are now being handled by County Judge R. H. Bunnell, with Constable Cozad handling small routine matters of the court. Justice of the Peace Hunsaker has been severely ill ever since taking office the first of the year.
